DOMINION DAY IN CAMP HOLIDAY FOR THE TROOPS

Programme of Sports Held by the Y.M.C.A.

MORE 59TH RECRUITS

ARRIVED IN CAMP FROM OTTAWA ON THURSDAY.

The 59th will have a Captain for the week. Instead of For the Day—Second Provisional School of Infantry to Open on 26th.

Domination was a holiday for all ranks at Barrfield Camp, and the opportunity for rest and recreation was fully taken advantage of. From early morning to late in the evening the centre of interest was the sports that were run off under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. A large number of the soldiers spent the day and evening in the city visiting friends, while nearly all those who remained in the camp were at the new Y. M. C. A. athletic field. With the exception of the absolutely necessary fatigue work, no drill was engaged in.

The Army Service Corps was, as usual, very busy, particularly in the morning, in the work of taking the supplies to the different units. The hospital was also busy, although there was comparatively little work for the staff on Thursday.

Capt. Stewart, 39th Battalion, is in Brockville on business.

Lieut. Col. Edwards, 38th Battalion, is expected to return from Ottawa on Saturday. Major C. Ferguson is acting officer commanding in his absence.

Cpl. Park, 8th C. M. R., was transferred from the Detention Hospital to the city hospital on Thursday.

Sergt. Major McKenna, 43rd Regiment, Ottawa, is becoming quite a regular weekly visitor in the camp. He brought in eleven recruits for the 59th Battalion on Thursday.

There were no accidents of a serious nature at the camp on the holiday. Six cases were handled at the Field Hospital.

Lieut. Col. Munroe, O. C. 8th C. M. R., has returned from Ottawa.

In future, instead of having a "captain for the day" in the 59th Battalion, there will be a "captain for the week," beginning with Revellie each Monday, and finishing at that time on the following Monday. Capt. W. L. Grant is on duty this week.

There are only two captains as yet in the 59th Battalion—Capt. W. E. Grant and Capt. A. W. Gray.

Capt. G. Crawford, 45th Regiment, has been attached to the 38th Battalion.

Sergt. J. A. Day, Lance-Corp. R. Nicol and Pies. W. J. Reynolds, R. Bailey, T. V. Gibson, E. V. Thrift, D. Cowley, F. C. Stevenson, M. Glasgow, W. Dooley and W. Sullivan will take a course of instruction in scout work, and will discontinue drilling with the 38th Battalion.

Lieut. Col. W. G. Wilby, Corps of Guides, who is attached to the 38th Battalion, will be instructor.

On Wednesday evening the choir of Queen Street Methodist Church gave a delightful concert in the Y. M. C. A. tent. There were several violin and vocal solos, all of which were much appreciated and loudly applauded by the soldiers. Col. G. Hunter Ogilvie, A. G., was chairman.

WAR BULLETINS.

It is reported that Krichka, in the hardnetles, has been captured by the Allies.

The Germans are moving great bodies of troops from the eastern to the western battle-front for another drive on Calais.

The British destroyer Lightening was damaged by a mine; fourteen men missing.

A determined naval attack by Germans in the Baltic was repulsed by the Russians with heavy losses.

Italian armies are sweeping on towards Trent.

An Italian lumber ship and two British wheat-carrying ships, all bound for Britain, were sunk by submarines; ten sailors are missing.

OFFICIALS FRUSTRATE HUNS' HOLIDAY PLANS

Extra Guards Ordered to Watch Buildings on Which Teutons Had Designs.

Toronto, July 2.—As the result of a general warning received from the Dominion authorities, to the effect that there was reason to fear that German sympathizers had planned to "celebrate" Dominion Day by the commission of a series of "demonstrations" against public and Government buildings, Hon. F. G. Macdormid, Provincial Minister of Public Works, took action to increase the guard upon all such buildings over the holiday.

Special vigilance was taken by the regular watchmen on the Parliament Buildings, while extra guards were placed upon Government House, Osgoode Hall and other public buildings. Factory buildings where Government contracts are being filled and other public buildings throughout the Province were also warned.

Hon. Mr. Macdormid stated that, while no alarm was taken of the warning, there had been sufficient grounds for the Dominion Government to issue it, and vigilant preventive measures were justified as well by both municipalities and private individuals.

SHE HAS A MOTIVE

Thaw Tells Why Evelyn Wants Him In Asylum.

New York, July 2.—Dr. Charles K. Mills of Philadelphia, a witness in the jury trial to test the sanity of Harry K. Thaw, testified that Thaw believed that his wife, Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, wanted him kept in the Matteawan asylum so that as an insane person he would be unable to make a will cutting her off from his fortune.

The question, put by one of Thaw's attorneys, was said to have been prompted by a publishing article quoting Mrs. Thaw as being fearful for the safety of her son if her husband were released. Mrs. Thaw, who has been served with a subpoena to reach here to-day and to testify as a witness for the state next week.

"Thaw told me," Dr. Mills said, "that his wife had motives in wanting to keep him in Matteawan. He did not think she had anything against him personally or was apprehensive for her son, but thought she believed that as long as he was in Matteawan he could not make a will cutting her off."

"WAR SHOCK"

New Affliction Being Discussed By Homeopathic Convention.

Chicago, July 2.—Treatment of "war shock", one of the newest afflictions known to medical science, was brought to the attention of the American Institute of Homeopathy at its annual convention here.

Dr. James Searson, of London, a surgeon attached to the Anglo-American Hospital, the homeopathic war base in Paris, in a paper on the work of physicians in the European war, wrote that "war shock" had caused much temporary insanity among the soldiers.

"One of the great problems has been the treatment of the new disease," Dr. Searson wrote. "It is an undefined, but real ailment, but in a large part to the terrible and incessant noises of gunnery and the generally acute excitements and emotions accumulating and impressing themselves on the nervous system. Quiet and sleep are the great need of the men, but it is hard to get them in a conditions where they can sleep."

"A most remarkable medical development is the way soldiers are able to stand up to their waists in icy water for stretches of thirty-six hours without visible injurious results. Trench foot has been much in evidence, but it is almost incredible how splendidly the mass of men went through the experience."

STEACY'S

WORKMEN'S RESPONSE
To Make Munitions Makes Compulsion Unnecessary.
London, July 2.—The seven days granted the trade unionists by the minister of munitions, David Lloyd George to make good their pledge that they would prove they were able to supply the needed munitions workers without recourse to compulsion, expired last night.

With respect to results, W. E. Morgan, who is Lloyd George's chief assistant in this department of his work said:

"The enrolments are so highly satisfactory that I think I can say that the voluntary system has justified itself as applied to munitions workers. During the last two days the enrolment has averaged 10,000 a day."
