Arrested at Trenton by Chief Graham, Napanee—The Accused Said To Have a Wife in Kingston. A Napanee despatch to the Whig says: Thomas W. Foster, a soldier belonging to the 38th Battalion, Kingston, for whom High County Constable Van Koughnet has been looking for the last few days on a serious charge, was arrested on Tuesday by Chief Graham of Napanee about five miles east of Trenton. Foster had coaxed a girl of about fifteen years of age to go away with him on July 1st, and has been wandering around the country sleeping in the open or in shacks. He forced the girl to part with some of her clothes in a second hand shop in Belleville, in order to get him a suit of civilian clothes, and his uniform was found near Belleville. Napanees

July 7.—At a meeting of the Town Council Monday night, the tax rate was fixed at 31 mills which includes the special tax imposed by the Provincial Government for patriotic purposes. A deputation of residents on Bridge street waited upon the Council to ask that repairs to the street be made between the intersections of West and East. The Council granted the request provided there are sufficient funds. That Commissioner J. Lowry has commenced to lay a sewer on Bridge street from Robert street, west two blocks. J. Watson, G. Not having the money, he was sent to jail. J. MacCullagh was fined \$5 for being drunk in a public place. John Woods another drunk was assessed likewise. TO HAVE NEW SERVICE

Fast Passenger Line From Toronto To Winnipeg. An important railway announcement is made to-day. The Dominion is to have a new service between Eastern and Western Canada. Fast Passenger service is to be inaugurated on July 13th between Toronto and Winnipeg over the Canadian Government Railway, (The Transcontinental), the Grand Trunk System, and the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway. These three railways are combining to make this new service of superior class in every respect. "The National" is the appropriate name which has been chosen for the principal train on both its east and west bound journeys. This train will leave Toronto each Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, and Winnipeg on each Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday, its equipment consisting of colonist sleeping cars, electric lighted first-class coaches, tourist and standard sleeping cars and dining car, which will be operated through without change. The mileage by this new route between Toronto and Winnipeg is 1,257 miles, and "The National" will make a fast run, covering the distance in forty-two hours. Westbound passengers leave Toronto at 10.45 p.m., and travelling over the Grand Trunk lines are at North Bay at 7 o'clock next morning. A splendid daylight run is then made over the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, through the scenic beauties of Timagami and the interesting Cobalt district. Cochrane is reached at 4.25 p.m., and "The National" there begins its journey over the main line of Canada's Transcontinental with its solid roadbed, little curvature and no noticeable gradients, all contributing to the greatest degree of comfort by day or night. It traverses a country of wonderful possibilities in which tens of thousands of settlers will carve out their homes in the future. The region between Cochrane and Winnipeg is one possessing great attractions for the sportsman as well as some of the finest fishing waters on the Continent, while big game abounds in the forests. There is an ever changing panorama of beauty. Great rivers, flowing north and south, have their source in this height of land country and here the Indians, unspoiled by civilization, still make his home in the virgin territory, for its natural loveliness has not yet been marred by fire or the lumberman. Before entering the Province of Manitoba the train runs through the famous Nipigon (country of lakes) region, another of Canada's magnificent holiday resorts, reaching Winnipeg at 3.50 p.m. Eastbound "The National" leaves Winnipeg at 5.15 p.m., arriving Cochrane at 5.15 p.m., next day and Toronto eighteen hours later, arrival in the Queen City being timed at 12.05 noon.
