## CORPL. R. J. GIMBLETT

### FULLY QUALIFIED FOR KINGSTON FIRE DEPARTMENT.

He Writes From France That He is Used to Getting Up At Uncertain Hours, Like the Fire Fighters.

A very interesting letter has been received from Corporal R. J. Gimblett, with the 5th Field Battery detachment. He writes under date of June 24th from France as follows:

"Since we have come back into France from Belgium we have had rather a quiet time compared to what we had there. Of course, the infantry has lost heavily again at Festubert and the artillery has been pounding away steadily, but there has been no such a row as was kicked up at Ypres. They seem to take it in spasms around here, and then at night mostly. Believe me, we sure pump some pills out when we do.

"As I write these lines the air is simply seething with the roar of gun-fire from both sides. There are a lot of guns in a woods about a

mile from here, and the Germans have been trying to put them out of action.

"There are eight-inch howitzers, 4.7 guns, and some French 75's there. The Germans are putting over some of their 'coal-boxes,' which are shells of about ninety pounds in weight, filled with high explosive, and burst on percussion. A great cloud of black smoke follows them, hence the name. They don't appear to do much damage with them, considering the amount they put over.

"The other night I was awakened about 2 a.m. by the roar of some of them going overhead into Bethune. I was up there next day on pass, and all the damage that I could see was a few windows destroyed and a few wires down. No one was hurt.

"We have had a draft of 5th Brigade men, and among them are several 22nd Battery men, including Bugler Poppiatt and Driver Clay.

"About a quarter of a mile from here are several armoured trains, and when they slip up the line a bit you hear something doing. They have done splendid work.

"The weather here is ideal, and much like Ontario, although there are more breezes, and that makes it slightly cooler. My mate (Robson) and I have constructed a bivouac out of three rubber sheets and some old out sacks, and a few feet of heavy wire and cord. Pretty comfortable and entirely waterproof, but the ground makes a poor mattress. We had a terrible thunder storm about a week ago, and heaven's artillery has it all over ours for noise, but I think ours is more deadly.

"We have roll-call at 8.30 p.m., and lights out at 9 p.m., so we go to bed with the hens. We are very lucky, however, if they don't start something, and we have to get out and rush up ammunition. It is rather mean to be pulled out of bed to harness and hook in and trot along a dark road almost before you are rightly awake. We have been on the move in little less than three minutes, which rivals the Kingston
