STREET CARS STOPPET

Kingston was without street cars on Friday night and all day Saturday, as a result of a serious break in the generator. Just when the cars will be in operation is not yet known. The company is doing its best to find the trouble, and have the necessary repairs made, and the public can be assured that just as soon as possible the system will be in good working order again.

The power went off at 6.45 o'clock Friday night. It was thought at first that the trouble would be of a minor character, but it was soon found that the break was a serious one, and that it would be some time before the cars would be able to make headway. The accident stop came as a great surprise to the passengers. Owing to the fact that the tie-up occurred early in the evening, there was but a small crowd at Lake Ontario Park. The street railway company immediately secured a number of autos to bring the people to the city. The attractions at the park, of course, had to be cancelled.
