THE RESIDENTS SIGN A NON-SUPPORT CASE THE CARS AGAIN RUN

FOR TARTIA PAVEMENT ON UNIVERSITY AVENUE.

Ald. Graham Has the Necessary Petition—A Special Meeting of the City Council To Be Held.

"I have more signatures on this petition to lay tartia pavement on University avenue than are required, and I hope to see that avenue paved this season," said Ald. Graham, chairman of the Board of Works, to the Whig.

Ald. Graham has been busy for the past week getting a petition signed by the property owners of University avenue for tartia, since he could not get two-thirds of the Council members to vote for the by-law. When a properly signed petition is presented for pavement, a majority of the Council members may grant it, so Ald. Graham is confident that the Board of Works' recommendation, recently adopted by Council, will be put into effect by a by-law. A meeting of the board has been called for Tuesday afternoon for general business, and the University avenue paving question will receive its attention.

Mayor Sutherland will likely call a special meeting of Council for Wednesday evening, and if the petition of the University avenue residents is found sufficiently signed, and if Ald. Graham can muster a majority of those present on his side, tartia will be laid on University avenue.

THE HUSBAND TO PAY MORE FOR FAMILY'S SUPPORT—SOLDIER IN TROUBLE—MEMBER OF "LIST" FINED.

William Joiner was charged in police court on Monday morning with the non-support of his wife and two children. It took over an hour for the hearing and the history of the unhappy couple was thoroughly threshed out. It seems that Mr. Joiner had a good position with the C. P. R. at Toronto but dissatisfaction led to a separation and he agreed to pay \$8 a week for the maintenance of his family. The wife and children have been living at Sharbot Lake, four miles away from her parents' home, and her father, she said, refuses to have anything to do with her. Two witnesses were called and after much evidence had been heard the magistrate decreed that Mr. Joiner would pay two dollars a week for the maintenance of his children.

A soldier was charged with house-breaking but although four witnesses showed that he had come into the house they did not show the reasons, and the magistrate gave him \$5 and costs for the trouble he caused. Harry Turner, a member of the "list," said that he got his liquor from a friend who has left for Montreal, but the story did not go, as Magistrate Farrell touched him \$15 with the option of a month cutting the Court House grass.

And Service Resumed Monday Morning—General Manager Folger of Civic Utilities, Prepared to Give Power for Partial Service. The street cars, after being stalled from Friday evening, were running bright and early Monday morning, and the hearts of the people were made glad, for it was feared that the trouble in the company's generator at the power house might be of such a serious nature that the service would be crippled for some weeks. However, it was apparent that the cars simply could not help turning out on the 12th of July with the arrangements.

The trouble was located in the armature. Two damaked coils were cut out and the circuit was closed. It was found that this was sufficient to supply all the power required. Of course there is a chance of another breakdown but the chance is also equal that there will be no further trouble. All Sunday, employees of the city electrical plant under the direction of General Manager Folger, were engaged running a temporary wire from the plant to the street railway company's premises on Queen street so that power for a partial car service could be given. In case of a further breakdown, this generator will be used. It is hoped, however, that it will not be required.
