HOW MR. MURRAY DIED.

Nursing Sister Writes the Dead
Hero's Mother.

Mrs. J. Murray, 224 Montreal
street, received a letter on Monday
afternoon from Nursing Sister M. A.

at Boulogne, France, telling how her
son, Gunner Frederick Murray, had
died after the battle of Lange-
marcke. Miss Tunley says:

"In reply to your letter, your son
when admitted to the hospital, was

He was conscious when he came in,
but later in the day he became un-
conscious and remained so until he
passed away. Everything that pos-

him, but in spite of all our efforts
