REATHES there a devotee of the rod and fly with soul so dead that he would not sit up and take notice upon being told that there is in Eastern Canada a region strawn with lakes, as the heavens are strawn with stars, where one can drop off the train and in three or four hours return with a "eatch" (weighing 50 to 60 lbs.) of those finny mariners which are as game as the black base and as beautiful as the rainbow. That region is the district which lies between St. Agathematic and the laurentians, Province of Quebec, and its myriad lakes—and streams—abound with grey and speckled trout, which, according to many experts with the rod, have no equal elsewhere for size, gameness, and variations in color shadings and speckling, To call this region "fishermen's paradise," is to indulge in a backeyned truism. Every one of those hundreds of knights of the feathered counterfeit of the gaudy-winged fly, lured myriads of "speckled beauties" from lakes and streams of the Laurentians, will aver insistently that no other waters could entice them away from these incomparable abodes of the grey and the speckled trout. And, truly, those who come, for the first time, to "try their luck,"

In the lakes and streams of the St. Agathe, Labelle, and Nomining districts will declare the region to surpass all their preconceived ideas, or dreams, of a paradise for him who finds the acme of happiness in enticing the wary trout from the dark, trout fishing in the world, both with rod and fly and with troil and spoon buit or minnows. 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
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
