THE SANITARY LIMITS OF THE CITY EXTENDED BY BOARD OF HEALTH.

Owing to Complaints Received With Regard to Nuisances—The New Area Regulation Will be Made Effective Next Spring.

The Board of Health, which met on Tuesday afternoon, unanimously decided to have the sanitary limits extended, and thereby get rid of many obnoxious cesspools and open-air closets that taint the atmosphere in certain residential localities. A letter had been filed by E. R. Beck, with complaining about some two or three of such nuisances which were a source of much annoyance to him and other property on Collingwood street. After due consideration it was moved by B. Blackhall that steps be taken to have the limit extended the same to come into effect next spring. The sanitary area will now be enclosed by the following boundaries: A line drawn from the water's edge to Raglan Road, up this thoroughfare to Division street, through Division street, to Chatham, to York, to Victoria, to Union, to Beverley, and the water's edge.

In the meantime Mr. Blackhall recommended that some of the city regulations be printed and forwarded to those landlords who persist in keeping insanitary dry-cloth closets. Sanitary Inspector Nicholas Timmerman will be given full power to summon all offenders before the Police Magistrate.

Inspector Timmerman presented his report, and several valuable pointers were given by him as to how conditions could be remedied. Everything which "Nick" undertakes is done thoroughly.

The Medical Health Officer, Dr. A. R. B. Williamson, moved that application be made to the Police Commissioners to have the work of the Sanitary Inspector extended until at least October 15th.

Some cases of dirty milk have been reported about the city, and Inspector Timmerman was given instructions to find out the offenders.

The following report regarding sanitary inspection was presented by Inspector Timmerman and Police Constable James Craig:

"We beg leave to report for your information that we have finished our annual sanitary inspection, and visited 5,092 houses. We found on the south side of Princess street 142 and on the north side 259 dirty yards, in all 392. There were also on the south side 37 and on the north side 34 dirty cellars, in all 71. This was at the time of our inspection, but they are now mostly all cleaned up."

"We notified 142 people to have the stable manure kept in a tight covered box while it remains on their premises."

"We also notified 87 owners of houses where there is no sink in the house to have sinks put in and connect with the drains in the streets, and 38 owners are notified to put in the sanitary improvements in their houses, said houses being in the last extended sanitary limit."

CITY OWNS THE POLES

And Not Street Railway Company, City Solicitor Says.

When asked what the understanding was with regard to the metal poles erected on King and Princess streets by the city, City Solicitor Givens, who drew up the agreement, said that it was never intended that the Street Railway Company should own them. The city erected them in place of the old wooden poles of the company, but they did not become the property of the company, which was merely permitted to string its wires on them.

Out of one lifeboat alone the men at work upon the yacht gathered a twelve-quart pall of flies.

The heavy rain of Tuesday afternoon evidently brought the flies to Kingston.

AGITATION IS ON.

To Have Government Plant For Filling Of Shells.

A. W. Wheatley, Manager of the Canadian Locomotive Company Limited, was asked as to the British Government's action in insisting that hereafter complete shells shall be made in Canada instead of empty as at present. He said that the work of putting in the fuses and explosives would involve a great deal of responsibility, and that there was an agitation now on for the Government to equip a plant for the placing of the fuses and explosives in the shells, which are already prepared with the shrapnel. In this way many concerns could make the shells and fill them, and the Government complete the job.

Mr. Wheatley says that the new building, in which big shells will be made, is nearing completion and will likely be occupied within two weeks.

HAS NO DESIRE TO BLOCK

The Utilities Commission in Removing King Street Poles.

Superintendent Nickle told the Whig on Wednesday morning that the Street Railway Company had no desire to block the Utilities Commission in removing the old city power poles on King street, between Queen and Brock streets. The work of removing the poles comes at a very bad time of year for the company, which has to take care of its feeder from the power plant. Mr. Nickle says that other cities give the railway companies the right to carry power wires on their metal poles, and the whole difficulty could be overcome if the city would grant this concession. Otherwise, the company will have to erect additional poles on King street between Brock and Princess streets, which it has a right to do, he says.

HUNDREDS OF WIDOWS

LIVING ON ONE STREET IN TOWN OF DOVEL, ENG.

George Roney, 21st Battalion, Tells of Visit He Made to the Town—Germans Pinned in Zeppelin Raid.

That there were three hundred widows as a result of the war in one street in Dover, where he paid a short visit, is the story told by George Roney, of No. 3 Company of the 21st Battalion, writing to a friend in Kingston.

"These men were all sailors," adds the writer, "and I am not saying anything about the large number of dear little children who have been left fatherless. I think there should be something done to have the single men go first, and then, if necessary, have the married men follow."

Mr. Roney speaks about a raid made by a Zeppelin on London recently. An attempt was made to drop bombs on a camp at Chatham, but they missed the camp. Instead, the bomb dropped in an open field near the camp. "The only damage it did was to cut down two trees and shake the windows in the houses nearby."

Since arriving in the Old Country, the members of the 21st Battalion have been issued with a new outfit and kit.

REGISTERED PACKAGE MISSING.

Eight Thousand Dollars Blows Out Of Car Window.
