THE GERMANS STORM

FRENCH POSITIONS IN THE BEAURAIN WOODS.

and Obtain a Foothold-The Enemy Lost Heavily In Attempt To Push Forward Their Lines Between St. Mihiel and Pont-a-Mousson.

Paris, July 15.—After several days of fierce battling north of Arras the French have captured a German trench south of Chateau Carleul in the War Office reported this afternoon.

It is admitted that this gain is partly offset by the loss of the Beaurian woods where the Germans have obtained a foothold by storming positions occupied by the French several weeks ago.

The enemy lost heavily in a renewal of the attempt of last week to push forward their lines between St. Mihiel and Pont-a-Mousson. Caught between a cross fire from machine guns and mitrailleuses, a German regiment that attacked near Feyenhaye was forced to retire. German attacks in the Labyrinth with hand grenades and bombs continue the official communique declared, but without results.



STATE OF SIEGE DECLARED AT KIEL

There Is No Explanation Given For This Very Extraordinary Procedure.


