STRANGE PREDICAMENT

OF A WOMAN AND HER TWO CHILDREN

She belongs to Watertown but is refused admittance at Cape Vincent—Her husband sold out and disappeared.

A woman and two children have been travelling back and forth on the steamer America since last Saturday, the immigration officers on each side of the border refusing to allow them to land. On Saturday last the woman and her two little children left her husband in Watertown, N. Y., came to Kingston and left on the train Saturday noon for Napanee. After a visit with friends there over Sunday, she returned to the city and bought a ticket to Watertown. When she arrived in Watertown she found that her husband had sold out everything in the house and left for Canada, so her neighbors said.

Accompanied by her two children, she boarded the America but the immigration agent refused her admittance as an undesirable and she had no means of support and might become a charge on the municipality.

The only other course open was to return to Cape Vincent but here the American immigration agent, Mr. Lewis refused to allow her to land as she could not prove she was an American or had any money.

Since then she has been living on the steamer, unable to land anywhere. On Thursday morning Mr. Creighton, the local agent, took her to the City Buildings where H. Wylie of the Children's Aid Society will look after her for the present. In the meantime the authorities of both Governments are endeavoring to find out her nationality, whether a Canadian or American, to decide where she will be allowed to locate.

OVER 150 STUDENTS

Are Attending the Queen's Summer School

A general meeting of the students of Queen's Summer School was held in Convocation Hall on Wednesday afternoon at 4.30 o'clock. The work of the members of the Association for the past year was reviewed by the president, J. T. Curtis. The students have pursued their usual system of advertising, and have met with surprising success, as the attendance this year is even beyond their expectations. There have been added to the curriculum of previous years classes in mineralogy, philosophy, and in the Faculty of Education. Queen's holds the unique position of being the only university in Canada which offers in its summer session the same line of studies which is offered during the regular winter session, and enables the students to pursue their course for a degree of B.A.

Prof. W. T. MacClement gave a short history of the summer school from its beginning in 1910. In that year 24 students were enrolled. In 1911 there were 27; in 1912, 48. Then in 1913 the attendance "fell down to 45, and in 1914, there were 73 students. This year, 1915, is better still, the attendance being more than double that of last year. The senate of Queen's has decided that the summer session shall hereafter be a permanent institution.
