# AT THE POLICE COURT

## FOREIGNER CHARGED THAT MAN TRIED TO ROB HIM.

### Two Russians Were Charged With Chasing Young Girls on the Street on Thursday Night—More Autoists Fined.

It was alleged in Police Court on Friday morning that Joseph Moran had a few drinks with a foreigner, who claimed to be a Roumanian, and then tried to rob him. Moran strongly denied the charge, however, stating that he had no intention of robbing the man. A soldier, who was called as a witness, stated that he saw Moran with one hand in the coat pocket of the foreigner.

Moran had a different story to tell. He admitted having a few drinks with the man, but said that the foreigner claimed he was an Australian and that he was giving every dollar he could to help the Germans in their fight.

"And you determined that you would not let him give another dollar to the Germans?" remarked the Magistrate.

The Magistrate adjourned the case for a day, so that further inquiries may be made.

Two Russians, who claimed to be going to Barrieffield Camp, were up for being drunk and disorderly. It was further charged that they chased young girls on Brock and Bagot streets last night.

In a ten-minute speech Karl Gold-man endeavored to explain to the Russians what had been said about them, but they shook their heads and denied all the charges. They were handed over to the military authorities.

The police are continuing their crusade against auto owners who violate the rules of the road. One was fined \$2 and costs for allowing his marker to be so covered in mud that the number could not be seen, and another was fined \$5 and costs for exceeding the speed limit.

The owner of a motorcycle paid \$5 and costs for running without a light.

The case against the driver of an auto, for causing bodily harm to Pte. J. A. Goodall, which was opened a few days ago, was further enlarged for a week. Several drunks were fined \$1 and costs each.

## THOUSANDS SOUGHT VIEW

### Of the Two Warships in Harbor Thursday Night.

Several thousands of people were down along the water's edge and upon the Kingston Shipbuilding wharf on Thursday evening to see the two Canadian warships, the cruisers Vigilant and Gannet, which suddenly made their appearance in Kingston waters at an early hour on Thursday morning. The guards at the gateway of the shipyard were kept busy from six o'clock until almost 9.30 o'clock allowing limited numbers to pass through. After this hour there were still hundreds of persons waiting to be allowed entrance, but the boat was turned and no more were given the privilege of getting close to these Government boats.

At an early hour on Friday morning both cruisers stole away for points unknown.

# MAJOR BRITTON SCORES

## McGREGOR, THE ABSCONDING MILITARY PAYMASTER

### He Says McGREGOR Played a Dirty Trick On Him—Declares His Story Is a Falsehood.

Major Russell H. Britton, Gananogue, with the Canadian Artillery in France, writes under date of June 29th as follows: "We have not been in very many hard fights lately, but have been doing a lot of moving around from place to place, and this means a great deal of hard work, as each move means 'digging in,' and that has to be done at night, so besides being hard work it means the loss of a great deal of sleep, and during this digging how the Gananogue tobacco is appreciated. If the donors could hear the thanks that is expressed they would realize how their gift is being appreciated; and we have got to the point where we watch for its arrival on each Thursday evening.

"Our present position is a very quiet one, and I am very glad of it, as we have been in action constantly since April 22nd, except for eight days, and that is a pretty long stretch, and is very trying on the nerves and muscles, as we are shifted to a new position every day or so, the last shift covering over twenty miles.

"We are on a hill this time, and the view is beautiful. The country is a flower garden in front and green crops and beautiful trees, behind, with towns and cities all around on the horizon. It is a great relief after the dose of flat country we have had, and I hope we stay here for a while.

"I was interested in reading the articles in the paper re my friend Allan McGregor. His paper statement is an exceedingly plausible falsehood. He didn't stay in Salisbury long enough to go through the terrible experiences he speaks about, and furthermore, there were no British troops there to do all the taunting he mentions, but I expect he will get what is coming to him, and he deserves it, as he played a dirty trick on me for sure.

"The boys are all well and in good spirits, and word came to us today that six days' leave was to be granted to all ranks, with railroad fare paid to London on return, so they will be happier still.

"Our casualties have been nil so far, I am glad to say, and I think we are safe here, so our friends need not worry at present about us."
