Capt. H. R. Wilson, 49th Regiment, Belleville, who is acting deputy assistant adjutant and quartermaster general of the 3rd Division in the absence of Major C. C. Bennett of the 21st Battalion, has been promoted to the rank of major. Major Wilson has been in the city since last year when he took the place vacated by Major A. E. Bywater, also of the 49th Regiment. He has proved a highly efficient staff officer and his promotion will be received with delight by his many friends.

The 8th C. M. R. requires at least two hundred men to take the places of those who have gone overseas. It will open a recruiting office in Ottawa at once, and Lieut. Palmer H. Wright left yesterday with a staff of N. C. O.'s to take up the work.
