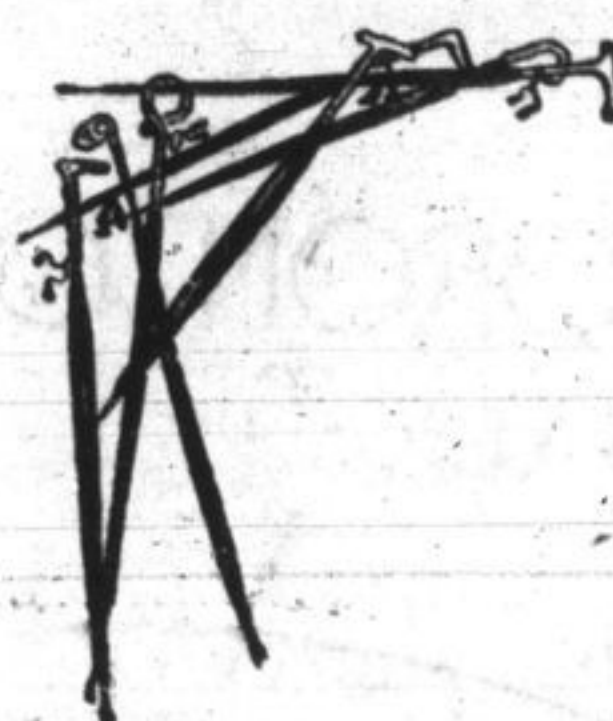
Decision Reserved.
