HEALTH OF THE CITY

MUST BE GUARDED, SAYS THE POLICE MAGISTRATE.

Four Citizens Were Fined For Not Having Proper Box in Which to Keep Manure—Matter Must be Given Strict Attention at Once.

"It is most essential that this matter should be attended to," said Magistrate Farrell in the Police Court, on Thursday morning, in imposing a fine on four citizens, who were found guilty of a breach of the Public Health Act, in that they did not have a proper box for the keeping of manure.

Magistrate Farrell pointed out that the necessary precautions were not taken by these men; that flies would carry disease and that it would be a serious matter. The charges were laid by Constables Timmerman and Craig, who conducted the house-to-house inspection, and the Magistrate made it plain that the law must be observed. He imposed a fine of \$1 and costs in each case. "I have a box, but it is not a suitable one," said one offender.

LOSES HER TWO SONS

BUT A CANADIAN MOTHER LIFTS UP HER HEAD.

Writes Rev. William Craig, Kingston, Who Baptized One of Them—The Quebec Province Mother Sorrow, But Rejoices.

On Wednesday Rev. William Craig, 375 Albert street, received a letter from Mrs. M. Piche, St. Charles, Que., whose two sons have been killed in action. Both of these boys had been baptized by Mr. Craig. Private Basil Randolph Piche, aged twenty-two years, was killed in action at Langemarck on April 23rd, after having rescued three wounded Turcos, and Sgt. James Harland Hird Piche, aged twenty-six years, was killed in action at La Bassee on May 20th.

In the letter Mrs. Piche, who writes: "I wish I could give you an idea of the help and comfort your letter brought to us in our hour of bitter grief. It took us back, too, to the day you baptized Randolph. What a blessing the key of all unknown, and I am glad. If other hands had held the key or if he had trusted it to me I might be sad. Sadness and sorrow must come through life, but with them also comes sustaining grace. How on earth can those who have no Saviour live through such a time? And there are so many even now whose burden of grief is heavier again than ours."

"I don't think the time has come yet for married men to leave Canada, so I am glad your son, Dr. Wilbur, will not have to go overseas. My husband would have been off in the first Canadian Contingent if he had not passed the age limit, and I would not have withheld my consent."

"The time may come, and it takes the last man or woman, too, the ideals that old England stands for must be defended. In all our sorrow there is so much to thank God for that we dare not murmur."

For these two Canadian heroes who fell nobly in battle a befitting memorial service was held in the Methodist Church, St. Catharines, on June 20th. The last hymn that the two dead boys sang before leaving for the front, which was then at the request of James, was sung at this memorial service. The first two lines of the first verse read:

"Jesus, Thou fount of loving hearts!
Thou fount of life! thou Light of men!"

KINGSTONIAN WOUNDED

OLIVER COTTER, WITH ENGLISH NEIBERS, HAD LEG FRACTURED.

He Was Wounded When Near La Bassee, and Writes a Letter Telling About His Experiences—Working Amid Shot and Shell.

Oliver Cotter, Kingston, a brother of Police Constable James Cotter, who left here with Queen's Engineers, was wounded near La Bassee. His right leg was badly fractured and torn. In a letter written on July 3rd he says:

"We left Houson yesterday morning, where we had been in a hospital for a few days, arriving at Southampton at 8 o'clock that night. Did not get off till this morning. We got a warm reception, as we were driven to the hospital. From here we went to a hospital in Weymouth. My right foot is badly fractured and torn, and it will be some time before I can get back to the front. My first night in the trenches was during the battle of Festubert. We were working out in front of the trenches through all that hell of shot and shell. It certainly made me realize it was the real thing."

"I was wounded near La Bassee, at a place called Beuvev. That was our second trip up that way, and the first-time we were called on to help out No. 1 Company. There was a most terrific artillery duel all night long. It was just like one continual thunder storm, in fact it was a living hell."

"Must tell you of my first trip up to the trenches. We left our billet and rode up to headquarters, where we waited. All was dark. Then we proceeded to go into the trenches. We had not gone very far up the road when a shell burst on our left. Everybody 'ducked,' but no person was hit, but a few of us got a lot of earth and stones on top of our 'domes' which Jack Johnston tore up, and I might add a big piece of shell went sailing close to our heads. They shelled us going all the way up, and when we dug into the trenches we realized there was no chance, as shell after shell came over, and then came the machine guns and rifle fire. We also met on the road up to the trenches a long procession of stretchers. We had to stand on one side of the road and let them by; poor fellows getting out the best way they could, some limping and others being carried on the backs of their comrades."

"Coming up the River Seine on the boat we saw about two hundred German prisoners on a barge being towed to some place. The nurses are very kind. We have a gramophone in the ward; it is going full swing and helps to pass the time."

Pat Kennedy Will Become An Aviator

"Pat" Kennedy, who made such a name for himself on the Rugby field playing for Queen's in the 1913 season, will go overseas as an aviator. He was in the city on Thursday, and stated that he had been accepted as a pupil in the next aviation course at Toronto providing a school of aviation is not started in Montreal before August 1st.

Prisoners in Germany.

American Consul F. S. S. Johnston has received from his Government official word of twenty Canadian who were reported as missing after the battle of Langemarck. Though Mr. Johnston would not give out the list for official reasons it is understood that a large percentage are prisoners in Germany.
