In a letter written on July 3rd he says:

"We left Houen yesterday morning, where we had been in an hospital for a few days, arriving at Southampton at 8 o'clock that night, Did not get off till this morning. We got a warm reception, as we were driven to the hospital. From here we went to a hospital in Weymouth. My right foot is badly fractured and torn, and it will be some time before I can get back tothe front. My first night in the trenches was during the battle of Festubert. We were working out in front of the trenches through all that hell of shot and shell. It certainly made me realize it was the real thing.

"I was wounded near La Bassee, at a place called Beuvey. Than was our second trip up that way, and the first-time we were called on to help out No. 1 Company. There was a most terrific artillery duel all night long. It was just like one continual thunder storm, in fact it was a living hell.

"Must tell von of my first trip up to the trenches. We left our billet and rode up to headquarters, where we waited. . All was dark. Then we proceeded to go into the trenches. We had not gone very far up the road when a shell burst on our left.
