The village of Warren, Ont., was practically wiped out by fire.

All the men required for the 74th and 75th Battalions are in sight.

The Unemployment Board issued a report urging labor bureaus for Ontario.

Lady Drummond expects to open a home for soldiers in the West End of London.

The managers of Hydro-electric systems in Ontario are holding a meeting in London.

Several "nosy" foreigners hanging about the aeroplane factory, Toronto, were interred.

The Women's Institute of Wellington held a Rose Day and raised \$200 for Red Cross work.

Hamilton plans to contribute 200 machine guns, a score of citizens having promised to give one each.

King George and Queen Mary will be present at the wedding of Miss Katharine Page, daughter of Ambassador and Mrs. Walter Hines Page, and C. J. Loring, Boston, on August 4th.

The German Emperor, visiting Posen, held religious services in the palace chapel. He requested the women's chorus to sing Luther's famous chorale, "A Mighty Fortress is Our God."

In Alberta, all the cities, with the exception of Lethbridge, went dry, Edmonton showing a majority of 2,600 and Calgary about 3,300. The new Liquor Prohibition Act goes into effect July 1st 1916.

A terrific explosion, believed to have been caused by sparks from a passing railroad engine, destroyed the benzol plant of the Semet-Solvay Company at Solvay, N.Y., on Wednesday afternoon. The loss is estimated \$40,000.

The Conservatives of Killarney have nominated for the Manitoba Legislature George Lawrence, Minister of Agriculture in the Roblin ministry. Lawrence is the only minister of the old government to be nominated so far.

J. J. Keppler, vice-president of the International Association of Machinists, who has been directing the strike at the plants of the Remington Arms and Ammunition Company and various sub-contractors, announced at Bridgeport, Conn., that a settlement had been agreed upon.

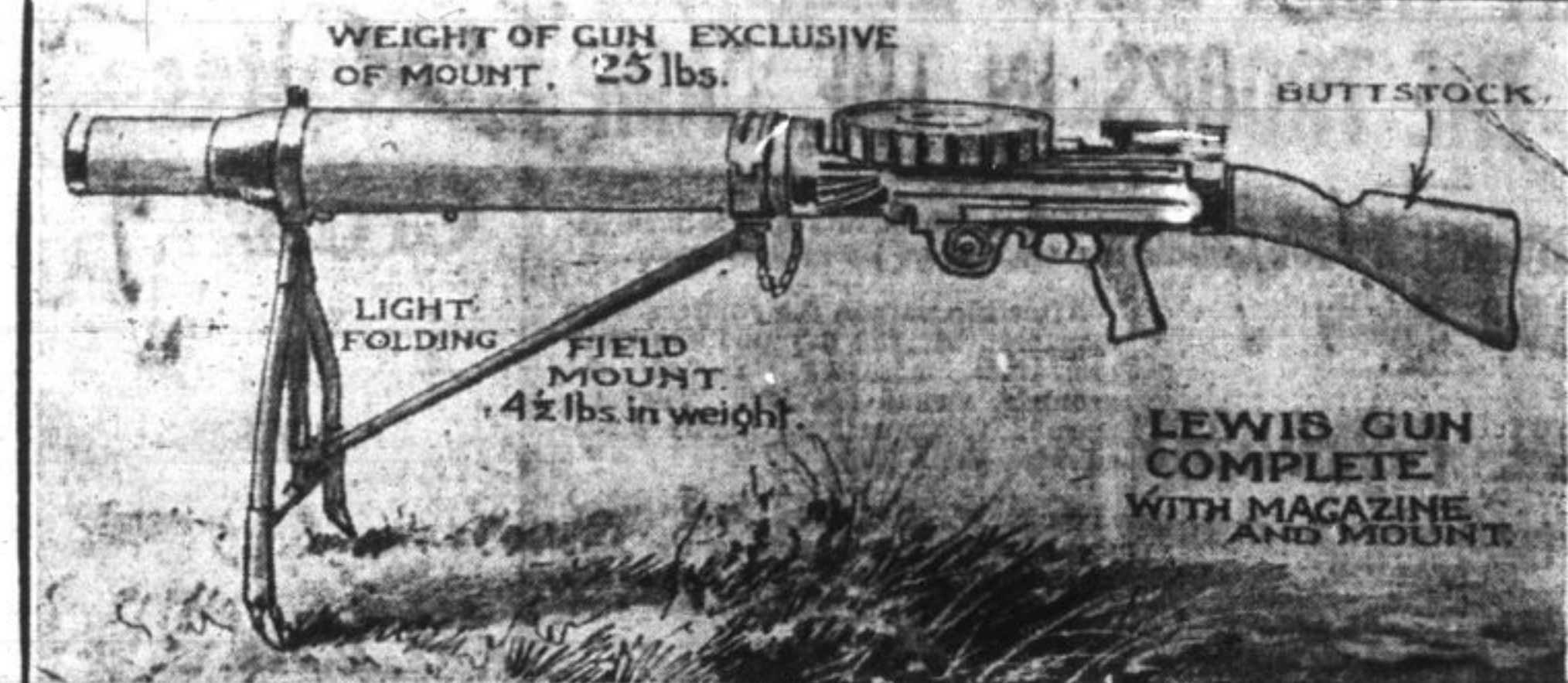

NEW MACHINE GUNS FOR CANADIAN TROOPS.

A sum of \$500,000 to supply 500 machine guns immediately for the Canadian troops, has been voted by the Ontario Government. The guns, which are in great need at the front, will be of the type shown here. This is the Lewis Automatic Machine-Gun. It weighs 29 1/2 pounds complete and can be fired from the shoulder. It will fire 140 rounds a minute and can be used for defense or offence.

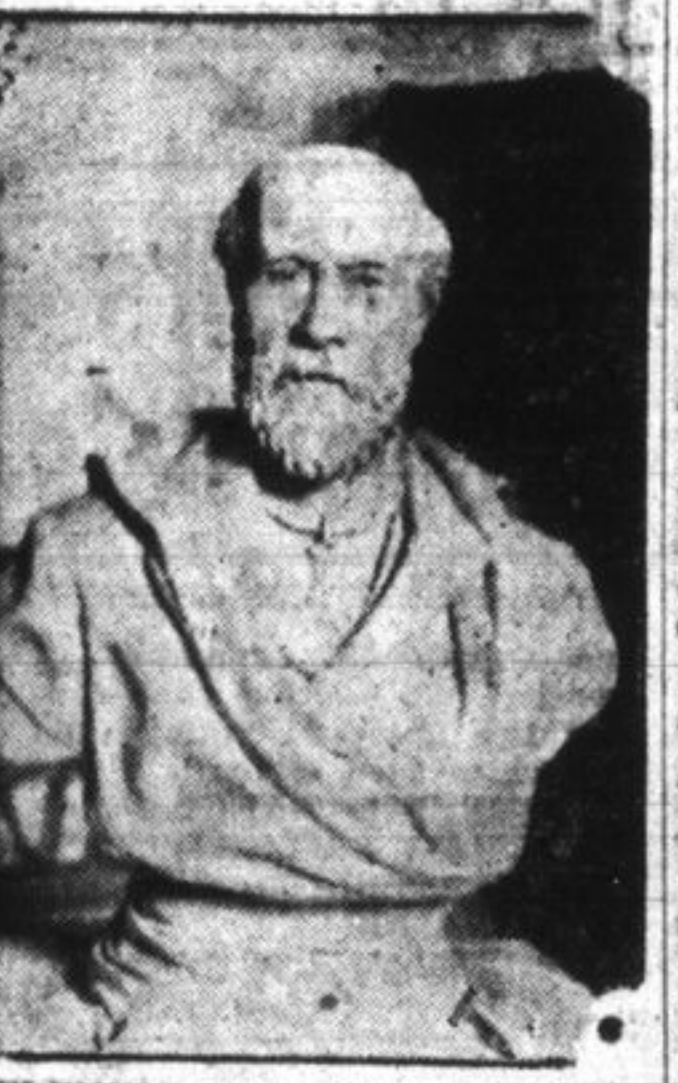
SIR SANDFORD FLEMING IS DEAD AT HALIFAX, N.S.

ing point of view may be gathered from Dr. Fleming's exhaustive report.

Some difference of opinion afterwards arose between Dr. Fleming and the Government concerning it, it is understood, the location of the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway and Dr. Fleming resigned his position as Government Engineer.

His proposition to establish a new prime meridian for the world, 180 degrees from Greenwich, was endorsed by the Imperial Academy of Science, St. Petersburg, most as soon as it was made public. For his distinguished

services Her Majesty invested him with a Companionship of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

The adoption of standard time by the German Empire was a great triumph for British ideas as developed in the fertile brain of Fleming's renowned civil engineer. Dr. Fleming at whose suggestion British standard time was chosen for the regulation of railway time all over the North American Continent.

In 1897, Dr. Fleming was made a Knight Commander of St. Michael and St. George. In 1898 he proceeded on a special mission to Australia and England with reference to the Pacific cable. In 1894 he was sent as a special commissioner to Hawaii by the Canadian Government.

In 1896, he attended on behalf of the Dominion the Imperial Pacific Cable conference in London. Politically he belonged to no party. In religion he was an adherent of the Presbyterian Church. His wife died in 1888.

The survivors of the late Sir Sandford Fleming are two daughters and three sons. Mrs. T. O. Critchley, Oxford street, Halifax, at whose residence the deceased passed away; Mrs. William Eschschaw, Archenon, France; S. H. Fleming, Hugh N. Fleming and Walter A. Fleming, all of Ottawa.

"I knew Sir Sandford Fleming all the years he was chancellor of Queen's University," said a Kingston newspaper man. "In 1880 I saw him cap his first graduate and in 1915 I saw him feel the head of the last graduate. He was a kindly, quiet, simple man, cultured, eminent and dignified, big enough for every task and dependable in every circumstance. He was a splendid looking man in 1880 when he first donned the chancellor's robes; robust, full-voiced and eloquent; in 1915 the weight of years had rendered him feeble, soft-voiced and reverent. He had spent his years, his spirit, his money and his fame for Queen's and richly had been rewarded. One building to over twenty crowned Queen's campus in his day; a handful of professors had grown to an army and a squad of students had become a battalion. A mighty man had fallen and Queen's men and women all over the world will mourn for him. His name will be imperishable so long as Queen's stands."

J. M. Farrell: "He was one of the men whose judgment was sought after in arriving at the proper course to pursue in the solution of University problems as they from time to time arose."

Dean J. C. Connell: "By the death of Sir Sandford Fleming Queen's University has lost one of its oldest and best friends. His interest in the university dates from 1876, when George Munro Grant was appointed Principal. Sir Sandford was elected Chancellor in 1880, and every three years since, re-elected by the unanimous vote of the University Council. He rarely missed any convocation or meeting of the Board of Trustees, and his interest was always maintained in the affairs of the university. His advice was always sought in determining the policy of the trustees. Thousands of graduates have been benefited at his hands, and all will remember the dignity imparted to the function by the manner in which he performed his duties. The university in all its facilities has benefited greatly by his generosity during all the years of his connection. His name and deeds will be written large in the Doomsday Book of Queen's University."

FRENCH TAKE MORE TRENCHES NEAR MUNSTER

(Special to the Whig.)—Furious fighting in Alsace in which French Chasseurs drove large bodies of Germans down the slopes of the Mountain peak known as the Little Reichackerkopf, was reported in official despatches to the War Office to-day. Throughout Tuesday night the Germans attacked time and again, marching up the mountain sides to the very edge of the French parapets. The French blue-devils stood their ground in the face of superior forces and played a machine gun fire through the German ranks until the enemy abandoned the attempts and retired.

Even more violent was the fighting west of Munster where the Germans made nine distinct rushes during the early hours of Wednesday in an effort, to recapture the positions taken by the French in the recent offensive in Alsace.

The enemy suffered heavy losses, and at dawn on Wednesday the French followed up their victory by taking 150 yards of German trenches.

This afternoon's communique reported that French airmen, continuing their attacks on railway junctions through which the German Crown Prince's Army is supplied, have bombarded the station at Autrey in Northwestern Argonne.
