A FIRE AT LANSDOWNE.

Hard Work of People Saved Village From Being Consumed.
Lansdowne, July 23.—Yesterday morning a large building owned by J. Cousaul was burned to the ground. The lower portion was used as a blacksmith shop by H. Leacock, and also Mr. McNamee as a carpenter shop. The upper story was used by S. Snyder as a paint shop. Very little was saved, and the loss will be severe to the gentlemen mentioned. Residents in the town and country turned out when the bells announced a fire, and all worked with a will to save the buildings on either side of the one doomed.
The greatest difficulty to contend with was the scarcity of water, as there is no fire protection, strange to say. All the wells in the vicinity were soon drained, but the willing workers were not daunted. They went wherever water could be had. Men, women and children carried and pumped water for hours, and barrels of water were brought by wagons and motor cars. Otherwise the whole town would have been in ruins. E. R. Johnston's store had a very narrow escape, and also the dwelling of Mr. S. Cousaul.

WHERE IS CLAUDE LEACH?

A Drygoods Clerk Disappeared Last Monday Morning.
What has become of Claude Leach, a young Englishman who had clerked in the drygoods store of J. G. Laidlaw, Princess street, for about six weeks? The young man in question is a tall, good looking chap whose age is twenty years. He left his boarding house on Division street last Monday morning and has not been seen since. When he first came to the city Mr. Leach went to the Y. M. C. A. building and inquired for a good boarding-house. S. Lilley had him located and from all accounts Mr. Leach appeared to be doing well until one afternoon he went to a picnic without asking leave of absence. Mr. Laidlaw discharged him from his employment.
On Monday morning Mr. Leach arose earlier than usual and had his breakfast, appearing as though he was ill. Finishing his meal he left the house, first taking off his rings and leaving them on the dresser in his room. He also left all his clothing behind except a gray suit which he was wearing.

TANGLE IN POLICE COURT.

Magistrate Had To Dismiss Assault Case After Hearing.
Magistrate Farrell, with the assistance of two lawyers, spent about half an hour Friday morning endeavoring to untangle a case in which two Russians were involved. Benjamin Bourluff was charged with assaulting Stephen Yankovich. It was alleged that he used a hammer to commit the assault, but after both sides had been heard the Magistrate could not fix the blame and dismissed the case. T. A. Rigney appeared for the prosecution and A. B. Cunningham for the defence.
The case against the driver of a taxi, who has been on remand several weeks charged with running over a soldier and doing him bodily harm, was dismissed. The police were unable to secure evidence to show that he was driver of the car.

Two Russian Workmen Were Badly Injured

Two Russians while at work installing shafting in the new smith shop of the Locomotive Works, on Thursday evening had a narrow escape from being killed and had to be taken to the Hotel Dieu. John, who is twenty-nine years of age, was on a scaffold about sixteen feet high. This suddenly crashed down and Mr. Bosick was sent to the hard concrete floor alighting heavily on his back and left leg. His spine was badly injured, his right arm dislocated near the wrist and his left foot was also dislocated. Mr. Bosick's condition is quite serious.
Henry Armeeshevich, the other injured Russian, was standing below the scaffold and he was forced to plunk. A deep gash was inflicted in his left shoulder and other injuries were sustained about his head.

DESERTED FROM 59TH

Barristfield Camp Soldier Arrested At Toronto.
A Toronto despatch says: "Fred. erick Austin was arrested coming into Toronto on a freight car early Friday morning, and in his pocket Grand Trunk soldiers found a complete set of military badges and buttons of the 59th Overseas Battalion, Kingston. Austin admitted that he had deserted and buried his uniform on a farm somewhere between here and Kingston. He would not say where he got the clothes he was wearing. Squire Hillis fined him \$1 and costs or fifteen days, and he will be held for the military authorities."

NEW MATRON AT WORK.

Case at Police Court Friday Required Her Attendance.
There was a case before the Magistrate on Friday morning which required the attention of the new police matron, Mrs. (Ensign) Smith, of the Salvation Army, and she was present. The case was that of a wayward girl who had been keeping late hours and mingling with strange men and giving her parents a great deal of trouble. She was further remanded until Wednesday.

DROWNS AT ROME, N.Y.

HENRY McCUTCHEON, KINGSTON, MET HIS DEATH

White Bathing on Thursday Afternoon—He Had Gone to Home to Work For His Brother-in-law.
While bathing in the canal at Rome, N.Y., on Thursday afternoon, Henry McCutcheon, son of Mr. and Mrs. John McCutcheon, who reside at the corner of Princess and Alfred streets, was accidentally drowned, having been seized with cramps. The young man, who was only nineteen years of age, had gone to Rome a short time ago to work for his brother-in-law, Bernard McCarey, who superintends bridge construction work. The deceased was a bright young fellow, and was very popular among scores of friends. Alfred McCutcheon, a brother of the drowned boy, who was formerly employed in the Randolph Hotel, went overseas with the officers' mess of the 21st Battalion. In religion the deceased was a Roman Catholic, and member of St. Mary's Cathedral.
The survivors are his parents, the father being employed as a lineman for the City Power Plant; two brothers and three sisters, Bernard, Alfred, Jessie and Marion, and Mrs. Bernard McCarey, the latter of Rome, N.Y.
The remains are expected to arrive here this evening.

Joining the C. M. R.

The Toronto Telegram of Thursday says: A squad of recruits for the Mounted Rifles were sent to Kingston to-day. The officer and corporal who selected these men were so careful in selecting them that not one of the fifty chosen was less than five feet six in height, and none were rejected because of medical unfitness.

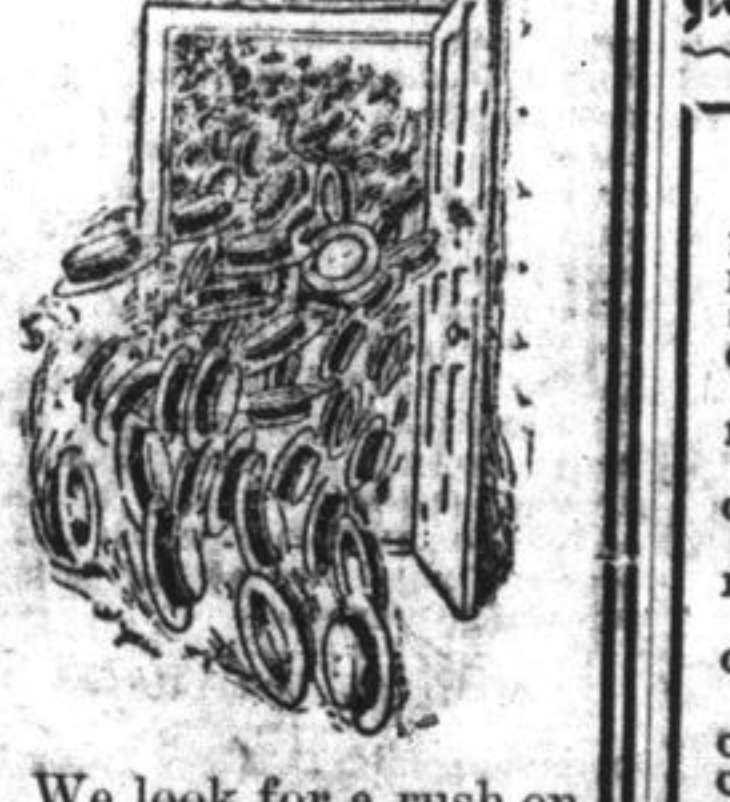
Yacht Ran On Stump.
