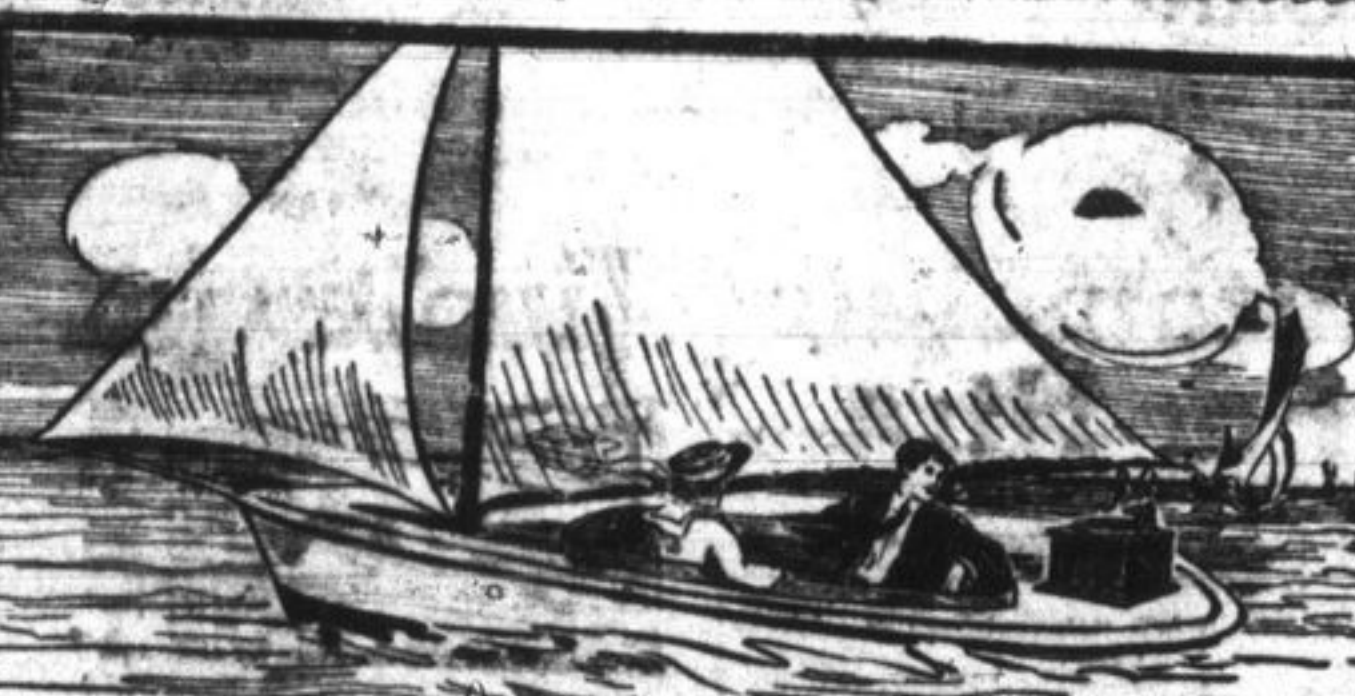

CAPT. GRANT'S TRIBUTE

TO THE LATE CHANCELLOR SIR SANDFORD FLEMING.

"The Soft-voiced Man Had a Will of Iron. God Send Canada More Such in Her Hour of Need."

Capt. W. L. Grant, 54th Overseas Battalion, when asked by the Whig for an expression regarding the late Sir Sandford Fleming, his deceased father's great friend for a quarter of a century, paid the following eloquent and touching tribute to the dead Queen's Chancellor:

"The last of the party who went from ocean to ocean has passed from the ocean of life to the ocean of eternity. The man who planned, and but for the politicians could have built the railway across the Rockies, has crossed the Great Divide.

"Sir Sandford was a great man, a man of vision, wise in counsel, skilled to administer. Ever since he reached Canada from Scotland in 1845, he had a share in every Canadian improvement. To him is due in great measure the C. P. R. To him is due the adoption of Standard Time, the Pacific cable, the foundation of the Canadian Institute, and a score of other things—small and great.

"His Scotch love of education made him the unwearied friend of Queen's University, and only those to some extent behind the scenes know what it meant to have the aid of the Chancellor.

"If he once was gripped by an idea, he worked on till that idea prevailed. The soft-voiced man had a will of iron. God send Canada more such in her hour of need."

CURIOUS FACTS DISCOVERED REGARDING SPOTTED FEVER

It is Possible For People To Have Disease Without Knowing It—Kose-Home Of The Germ.

Some curious facts are being discovered about spotted fever, or cerebrospinal meningitis. The symptoms to which these names are applied constitute a very severe and fatal illness which has been of the scourges of soldiers in the trenches, and even in the camps at home.

But it seems that the particular germ which causes spotted fever does not always get so far, and any number of us may have had spotted fever, without knowing it. It may

pass for an ordinary cold or a form of influenza, and it is only by bacteriological examination that it can be identified as spotted fever unless it proceeds to the last stage.

This seems to account for the curious way epidemics of spotted fever spring up. The epidemic seem to have no connection with each other, and no connection can be traced between one case and another. It is now believed that the explanation is one outbreak of recognized spotted fever and another are the mild cases which are never recognized at all, and also a considerable number of carriers of the germ who do not seem to suffer anything at all from it themselves.
