MILITARY TAILORS.

TWO COUNTY CASES \$580 SO FAR RAISED

HEARD BY MAGISTRATE HUNTER FRIDAY NIGHT.

A City Autoist Pleaded Guilty to Violation of Law—Dog and Bad Language Case Settled.

Justice of the Peace George Hunter disposed of two cases on Friday night which took up his time until midnight.

The case arising out of the biting of a boy by a vicious dog and the charge of using grossly insulting language which followed were aired. Two residents of the county were the principals. By the advice of the Magistrate the parties settled the case.

A resident of the county brought action against a city resident on three counts. The first was that of carelessly and negligently driving a car on a public highway, the second that of refusing to give half the road to the plaintiff, who tried to pass in his automobile, and the third of not returning to the scene of the accident that followed and giving his name. J. L. Whiting conducted the prosecution and D. A. Givens acted for the defendant. After an argument which lasted until midnight the first two charges were withdrawn, and the defendant pleaded guilty to the last charge. Each side had four witnesses. The judgment was a fine of \$10 and costs or ten days in jail.

MARCONI SAW BATTLE FROM AN AEROPLANE

Italian Wireless Wizard in London Buying War Material For His Country.

London, July 24.—Signor Marconi, now Lieutenant of Engineers in the Italian Army, is in London buying general war material for the army. Though only a subaltern, he is on the engineering staff of the army and on a committee which looks after the electrical equipment for the navy. He also has a good deal to do with aeroplanes and dirigibles.

"I have visited most of the Italian front," said Marconi. "From an aeroplane I saw an artillery battle. It was an awe-inspiring sight. The big shells shook the air like volcanoes. Our troops got the best of it. Their spirit is splendid and their ardor and enthusiasm beyond price."

"It is encouraging for the Italians to advance into territory which once was Italian, became Austrian, and now is Italian again. The Italian residents, who proponderate, are delighted."

Gun Platform Located.

Montreal, July 24.—Coincident with the appearance with what is believed to have been an aeroplane over Chateauguay on Tuesday, when a German officer who resided there, was said to have been carried away, came the discovery that a German had installed a concrete tennis court in his garden there. A gun placed upon this court, which has several feet of concrete under it, would command the Soulanges canal and an important railway bridge.
