BECKER'S END He Protested His Innocence to the Last. TOLD FATHER CURRY HE WAS BEING SACRIFICED FOR HIS FRIENDS.

PROOF THAT HUNS POISONED WATER London Gets Facsimile of Intercepted Message Sent by German Officer.

London, July 30.—The Press Bureau publishes a fac-simile of an intercepted message alleged to have been sent by a German captain named Kruger to Pforte, an outpost in German South-west Africa. The translation follows: "The patrol at Gabit has been instructed, so far as possible, to contaminate the Ida Mine. Observe extreme caution in entering Swakop and at the Ida Mine. Don't water there."

SENATOR STONE DECLARES U. S. WILL NOT ENTER FIGHT

Of course if another Lusitania is torpedoed and another hundred or more Americans drowned—but, I won't discuss such a possibility; it isn't a thing to talk about."

GERMANS FORTIFYING BELGIUM--WHAT FOR? Is Gigantic Movement Against Belgium by Allies Anticipated by German War Leaders?

Amsterdam, July 30.—An impregnable line of fortifications, defended by heavy guns, is being built by the German army in Belgium from Namur to the German boundary. The new defensive works are constructed with steel beams. They are equipped with bomb-proof covers, electric lights and telephones. The new fortifications are more than forty-five miles in length.

RUSSIAN PEOPLE ASKED TO HAVE FAITH

Newspapers Call Upon People to View Events About to Transpire With Confidence.

WILL MAKE DYE STUFFS. HELPS THE GERMANS. Two Canadian Companies Hope To Do Work.

Quebec, July 30.—That at least two Canadian companies are grasping the opportunity offered by the failure of German concerns to furnish dyes to America, to boost their own business, is shown in the last issue of the Quebec Official Gazette, announcing the incorporation of the two new companies that will produce the dyes.

Mounting Heavy Guns. HELPS THE GERMANS.

Athens, July 30.—The Turks are mounting heavy batteries in the Greek quarter of Tavata, according to reports forwarded from Constantinople. The former company is backed by Montreal capital, while the latter is promoted by Sherbrooke interests.

GERMANS STAKE EVERYTHING ON BIG DRIVE

London, July 30.—The Petrograd correspondent of the London Daily Telegraph cables: So obscure is the situation here that even that semi-official critic, The Rusky Invalid, is compelled to admit uncertainty as to whether what is now going on between the Vistula and the Bug is the crisis of battle or only one of those pauses to allow one side or the other to draw breath or effect a rearrangement of its forces.

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
