HEADN TO GET AWAY.

The Kingston Boys Anxious to Get Into Service.

Corpl. F. W. Noyes, of the 5th Field Ambulance, at Otterpool, England, writes a very interesting letter to his father, George Noyes, Frontenac street, which reads in part: "Do not worry if you do not hear regularly from me, because we are all pretty busy and cannot always get a seat at a table to write when we do have the time. Received a letter from George (brother who is recovering from wounds) received in Langemarck, and he is coming to Hythe, which is but four miles from here, so that we will be together quite a lot if all goes well. It is certainly a great piece of luck for him to be sent here."

"Rumor has it that we are due for the Dardanelles, and as far as I am concerned, it does not make any difference how soon they send us away."

"We were inspected by General Hughes and Sir R.L. Borden last Saturday, and it was a great sight for anyone to see. There were thousands and thousands of us, and what I saw looked fine. It is expected that the King and Kaiser will visit us almost any day now."

"Am receiving letters regularly, and there is a lot of news in them; they read a lot different to the papers here. There are new troops moving near to us each day. Just came off an evening tour guard, and am feeling tired and sleepy, so will close."

Gunner Dixon Writes Home.

Sergt. W. Bolt, "C" Battery, R. C. H. A., has received an interesting letter from Gunner Thomas Dixon, who went overseas with the last draft from "C" Battery, and is now at Maresfield Camp, Sussex, England. The letter reads in part: "We were thirteen days coming over; had a good voyage, but I was seasick for a week. The first night we were in camp we were all in the same building; eight of us are now in another place. The building is divided into compartments. The room next to us is being used by Sergt. Murphy, Sergt. McKay, Corpl. Austin, and Gr. Richeson, batman to Sergt. McKay. We are known here as the headquarters party, and have done some fatigue work since we came. Some of the drivers have been on a ride, and both gunners and drivers have had a couple of days at section-gun drill, etc. All the drivers have to learn gunnery as well as us. We all eat in the same place. We only drill a few hours a day and break off at 4 p.m. The detail of the men each day from the different detachments. Each of us has to do a picket about once a month. We get up about 5.30 a.m., have breakfast about 7.30 a.m., fall in at 9 a.m. They are not nearly so particular with their horses here as at Tete de Pont Barracks. We were out last night digging trenches about four miles from the camp, and all the batteries are going out again to-morrow night. The place we dug last night was for the headquarters party. They intend to dig a series of trenches to accommodate the both batteries. They will cover them over, making them bomb-proof, the same as at the front. They will all be connected by telephone. The telephone wagon carries eight miles of wire. I have been to two lectures on the use of the heliograph and the telephone. The signalling instructor here is Sergt. Wampston. I was at a court-martial yesterday, an escort, Corpl. Wolfe was one of the witnesses. There are two dry and one wet canteen here and a Y. M. C. A. There is a concert in the latter place every night. Beside the R. C. H. A. here, there are several detachments of Yeomanry. We are eighteen miles from Brighton and forty miles from London. We get very little news of the war here.

"We get good grub, have comfortable quarters, lighted by electricity. Mr. Williamson rode to London a short while ago. Mr. Stewart and he are still our lieutenants."

"We lost twelve horses on the way over. I met a fellow here that I worked with in Alberta."
