COLLECTING GARBAGE

WILL ALSO PROVIDE FOR TAKING AWAY OF ASHES

Board of Health and Garbage Committee Had Joint Meeting Friday Afternoon—Considered Draft By-Law To be Presented to Council.

On Friday afternoon there was a joint meeting of the Board of Health and the Civic Garbage Committee, with all the members in attendance, when the scheme for garbage collection in the city was gone into, also the draft by-law to be presented to the City Council, and which was prepared by Ald. Wright, chairman of the Garbage Committee, and the City Engineer.

The plan is to have a collection made of ashes as well as garbage, and refuse of kind and it is also the intention to have an inspector appointed. Applications have been received for the position, but no appointment has been made as yet. The inspector will take over the duties of the police, who have in the past been conducting yard inspections, and also the work of William McCammon, the market clerk, who has been doing sanitary work.

The inspector will work entirely under the Board of Health, and be responsible to that body, and no committee of the City Council will have any authority in the matter. It is believed that all the plans and arrangements will be completed in about two weeks' time, for the collection.

Owing to the stormy weather of the past few days, a delay has been caused in getting the smoketank up for the incinerator, but it was expected that this job would be completed on Saturday.

Holding an Investigation.
A Toronto despatch states that Joseph Rogers, superintendent of provincial police, and R. H. Greer, county crown attorney for York, have been in Frontenac county holding an enquiry by order of Hon. I. B. Lusk, attorney-general for Ontario, into the allegations of dynamite outrages.

It is stated that for a number of years dams erected by various power companies have caused farm lands to be damaged by extensive floods, and that dynamiting of the dams has been a sequel.
