Jailed in Holland. London, Aug. 7.—The Daily Mail correspondent at the Hague telegraphs that certain employees of a foreign legation there have been arrested by the police with the consent and approval of the Dutch Foreign Office, which required the legation to waive diplomatic rights of immunity.

The newspapers of The Hague refrain from mentioning the name of the legation. To Have Fewer Pages. London, Aug. 7.—Decreased advertising revenue and a shortage in the supply of chemicals necessary for the manufacture of white paper have resulted in an agreement by the proprietors of London's newspapers to reduce the number of pages. The Post-to-day contained ten pages, while the Times, Telegraph and Standard contained twelve. Some of these two-cent dailies frequently have printed twenty or more pages since the war has been in progress.
