
Beited to a short walst and pleated in the most graceful manner possible. this little girl's "Oliver Twist" dress strikes an entirely new note in fashion. It is developed in gingham of good quality and is guiltless of any decoration save the pearl buttons that appear down on the front and around the belt. The collar is a turn-down effect, but very hot, soapy water for 5 or 10 the neck may be left open also. For medium size 3% yards of gingham 36 inches wide will be necessary to make the design.
