Reported in London Affect Stock Exchange. (Special to the Whig.) What Gun Cotton Is.

Sir William Ramsay, the noted British chemist, defines cotton as gun cotton, and says that it is the only material which is in use for propulsive ammunition; that other explosives, such as picric acid and trinitrotoluene, if fired "in" a gun would burst it. They may be used as fillings for shells, for they are stable enough to be fired from a gun without exploding until, when they reach their mark, the detonator of the shell explodes them. This is done either by means of a time fuse or by impact with some object.

EFFECTS OF SLAIN ARRIVE.

Belongings of Canadians Killed Sent to Next of Kin.

Ottawa, Aug. 12.—Pathetic mementoes of Canada's sons who have fallen at the front and now lie buried on the battlefields of France and Flanders are arriving at Militia Headquarters here. They comprise the personal effects of the dead Canadians, articles of clothing, photographs, letters, bits of jewellery, Bibles and keepsakes of all kinds. The effects have been forwarded from the Canadian base at Boulogne for distribution to next of kin in Canada. All of the express companies doing business in Canada have agreed to forward the packages free of charge to the families of the dead.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

Despatches from Near and Distant Places. J. R. Cartright has been gazetted temporary Lieutenant of the 3rd Toronto Battalion. General S. B. Steele of the Canadian militia is gazetted attached to the Headquarters Staff. The new Hydro-electric system of street lighting was formally opened in Renfrew on Wednesday. The Hydro-electric Commission has successfully harnessed the Falls of Eugenia for power development. Mrs. Clarence Cox, a young woman of Port McNicoll, was burned, probably fatally, when using coal oil to light her kitchen fire. The French asserted that their prisoners of war had been unjustifiably sent by the Germans to the Hanoverian swamps.

Latest recruiting figures for Toronto show that the 2,000 mark is nearly reached. Toronto's total contribution is now nearly 20,000.

The Dominion fisheries branch will not only maintain an exhibit, but operate a restaurant also to advertise Canadian fish as an article of diet.

Fred. Moyses, a popular and efficient member of the Toronto Globe mechanical staff, was drowned at Etobicoke Creek by the overturning of a rowboat.

The will of the late E. C. Walker, of Walkerville, filed for probate in Essex County Surrogate Court, dispenses of an estate of \$14,126,000 is said to be the largest in volume and value ever probated in Ontario.

Henry J. Chute, Kentville, N.S., whose son Roy sold an unserviceable horse to the remount department, asked Sir Charles Davidson, Commissioner on war contracts, for permission to refund the price, \$165, to the Government.

Thomas Moffatt and James McDonald, who attempted to escape from the Provincial Prison Farm at Guelph, but were captured, were sentenced by Magistrate Watt, Moffatt to two years in penitentiary, and McDonald, to three years.

Announcement is made that for the first time in the history of the sugar trade Switzerland has purchased sugar from the United States. Its initial order is for 1,000 tons of granulated. Hitherto Switzerland has bought sugar from Germany and Austria.

Memorial To Hon. C. F. Fraser. Brockville, Aug. 12.—A proposal has been made to erect a monument here in memory of Hon. Christopher Finlay Fraser, Minister of Public Works in Ontario, during whose administration the Parliament Building in Toronto was constructed. The Eastern Hospital here, in the grounds of which it is proposed to erect the monument, is also a child of his brain.

Edward Barry Died in German Hospital, May 1st

Word was received by American Consul Felix S. S. Johnson on Wednesday morning that Pte. Edward Barry, son of Mrs. James, Ellise street, had died in a German hospital on May 1st having been wounded in the battle of Langemarck, and taken prisoner by the Germans.

Immediately after the battle of Langemarck Pte. Barry was reported missing, but it was not until Wednesday morning that the family got any word of his fate. As soon as the list announcing him missing was received, the family got into communication with the militia authorities at Ottawa, but were unable to get any other word than that he was missing. They placed the matter in the hands of United States Consul Johnson, who communicated with the American Ambassador at Berlin, with the foregoing result.

When the family was called on by a Whig representative, the mother was so broken up over the news that she could say nothing. When the call came last August for Canadians to go to the front, Edward Barry was one of the first to enlist. He enlisted with the 14th Regiment contingent under Captain George T. Richardson. While at the front he proved himself to be a good soldier. Some time ago Capt. Richardson wrote the mother of the deceased stating that her son was missing, but that was all he was able to find out.

Before enlisting Pte. Barry was engaged as clerk in the store of A. Roney & Co., Princess street.

OBITUARY

The Late Mrs. B. H. Williams. At her late residence, 11 Colborne street, on Thursday morning, Lena Whelan, wife of B. H. Williams, passed away after a brief illness. The deceased was born at Westport thirty-six years ago, and for the past year had resided in Kingston. Previous to this she lived at Garden Island.

Her loss will not only be mourned by her family, but in her death the Orphans' Guild of St. Mary's-of-the-Lake will be deprived of an energetic worker. In religion the late Mrs. Williams was a devout Roman Catholic, and member of St. Mary's Cathedral. She was also a member of the League of the Sacred Heart.

To mourn her loss there are her husband and one daughter, Mary Williams, residing at home. Mrs. A. P. Donnelly, Vancouver, and Sister Mary Martina and Sister Mary Loyola, both members of the local House of Providence, are sisters of the deceased.

GERMANY MUST CUT

Her Way Through To Constantinople, Says Count. (Special to the Whig.) London, Aug. 12.—Discussing the Balkan situation in the Tage Zeitung, Count Reventlow declares that Germany must cut her way through to Constantinople and make the new Triple Alliance in reality.

The demand for direct communication between Hungary and Turkey, he writes, "has found expression more and more energetically during the past few months."

The Balkan situation is featured by this morning's papers. Serbia's unwillingness to cede territory, claimed by Bulgaria, which will be necessary to insure the active cooperation by Bulgaria on the side of the Allies, has had a discouraging effect.
