A PETTICOAT FOR THE WIDENED SKIRT.

Materials as do the skirts that are worn over them. Two narrow ruffles finish the bottom and the width around the lower edge is about 3 1/4 yards. As illustrated, the petticoat requires for average size six yards of material. If made without the ruffles, however, 4 yards will be sufficient.

The back and side gores of the petticoat are cut from an open width of the material, both sections of the pattern being placed on a lengthwise thread. Then, folding the material, place the yoke on a lengthwise fold and to the right of the yoke lay the front gore.

The back can be in either pleated or habit effect. Much depends upon the figure of the wearer in deciding this matter, for in the case of stout women surplus fullness must be eliminated as much as possible. If the habit back is desired cut off back edge of back gore on double small "o" perforations. When the yoke is to be added cut off upper edges of gores on single small "o" perforations.

The extra fullness in the newest petticoats may be displeasing to some women, but they should rejoice over the fact that the increased width of the outer skirt does not call for such voluminous, really ugly underskirts as were worn in the days when petticoats measured yards and yards around the bottom.

On many of the latest petticoats a touch of black is noted, because black and white combinations are so fashionable just now. Embroidery stitches are employed to add the black note on a petticoat of pussy willow taffeta or even on wash materials adjustable frills of black lace and silk are used. The frills having headings of braid, which are supplied with buttonholes placed very close together so that they may be buttoned on to the petticoat.
