We are about a mile from a village. I think that we will all like it well after we get settled down. We had water-melon and bananas for breakfast yesterday.

"We certainly had a dandy sail from the time we left the Canadian shores, as it was not at all rough. I have to go on guard to-morrow for a period of three days. We have three days on and three days off, but you cannot leave barracks without a pass.

"The Royal Canadian Regiment which has been doing duty here since the outbreak of war is to leave some time to-day (August 12th). They are certainly mighty glad to get away and do their bit at the firing line."

Their Nerve Tonic Gone.

Hugh P. Hamilton, of the 5th Battery, Field Artillery, formed of the old 21st Westmount and Nova Scotia contingents, writing of the big fight and the great stand of the Canadians at Ypres, says:

"This is the position we found ourselves in—nothing to back us but cold steel and this one last round of good old British high explosive. I speak of a cold chill—not 'cold feet'."

After we had smoked the last of 500 cigarettes, which was the only article for nerve trouble we had, and an attempt to look unconcerned and happy, some kind fool reminded us that there were only four rifles in our sub-section. Just at this moment we all experienced a feeling no one can explain but those placed in the same position, something similar. I should think, to that of Eliza when she made her last 'get away' over the ice and 'put 'em over' the hounds. No, we did not make that get away, but were told that reinforcements were arriving, and that so there were eight wagon loads of high explosives cutting across country and on their way to us.

Finally reinforcements and ammunition arrived, and then came on Germans. They came, but most of them, with the exception of those who disappeared over the horizon, will stay for some time."

The above extract furnishes just another proof of the value soldiers just arrived put upon a smoke. The cigarettes were the only nerve tonic the boys had, declares his gunner "And we had smoked the last of the 500," he adds. Well, Mr. Gunner, more are on the way. We hope this intrepid battery gets their share without loss of time.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

THE SCHOONER MAIZE HAS BEEN RE-FLOATED.

The Steamer Kenora is Expected To Enter the Kingston Shipbuilding Drydock on Wednesday.

The schooner Maize, sunk beside the wharf at the old G. T. R. freight sheds, foot of Johnson street, on Sunday morning, was re-floated Tuesday night and taken to the graveyard for old derelicts below Cataragui bridge. Besides the pump, which Grant Pyke had placed upon the schooner to bring the wreck here from Howe Island, and which broke down, resulting in the boat sinking again after reaching the city, another siphon was loaned by the Donnelly Wrecking and Salvage Company. Two tugs, the Ray Stanton and the Frontenac, generated the necessary steam to place these into operation. The task was a big one to displace the large quantity of water before the Maize was re-floated to the surface, but success crowned the untiring efforts of those in charge.

Whether Captain John Sowards, the owner of the schooner Maize, intended to place her in commission again is not certain.

The American steamer Lehigh, which was stranded near Lachine, is also expected within a day or two at the same dock, to be made water-tight and taken to Rochester.

The tug Hall left Prescott on Wednesday with oil barge 41 for Montreal.

The tug Bronson is due on Thursday from Montreal with two light barges.
