### MEMBER KEPT ALONE

#### "I AM GETTING OLD," WRITES DR. BELAND.

A Canadian M. P. in a German Prison is Suffering Much—He is Hoping For Relief.

Quebec, Aug. 21.—A letter received by members of his family, gives interesting though saddening news of Dr. H. S. Beland, M.P., for Beauce County, in the provincial Commons, who is now a captive in a German fortress, after having been interned from Belgium where, in his castle at Cappelan he was treating wounded soldiers.

The doctor says that, recently, he has been treated by the German authorities and that in his cell, instead of being quartered with four other prisoners, he is now allowed to stay alone.

The doctor says his people would be deeply surprised if they only saw a photograph of him.

"I'm getting old," he says, "though all this suffering and harrowing scenes and there is a lot of gray in the dark hair of your affected friend. However, I have indications that I will be freed soon. I was told by a responsible official that steps were being taken to fix the necessary matters that will bring me back to hospital work and now I live with the hope of this day."

### THE RUSSIANS CLAIM

#### That They Hold Some of the Kovno Forts.

Petrograd, Aug. 21.—Kovno retains the centre of operations. In one fort on the left bank of the Niemen the enemy managed to establish himself. In several others to the westward of Jescs the danger of the position is gradually increasing. Yet as long as the Russians continue to hold part of the angle formed by the Lower Niemen and Jescs, whose deep banks offer them a convenient position allowing them to conceal numerous obstacles such as barbed wire traps, there is still hope, experts say. Until the enemy occupies the region between the right bank of the Jescs and Niemen his hold on the left bank is not secure. Therefore he is endeavoring to reach the right bank of the Jescs and is not attempting to cross the Niemen attack the forts on the right bank which are outside his range of fire.

The enemy gained his swift success at the cost of colossal losses. He stormed Kovno hurriedly, seeing that its fall would facilitate earlier reinforcements for his forces on the Baltic, which is of foremost importance to him at the present time. The hurricane of violent fire swept and broke the armored turrets of the batteries, turning over the concrete platforms, so that it was impossible for the garrison to hold out. Germans, chiefly from the north-east, continue to attack Novo Georgievsk, where the forts defend the railway from Miawa, which is necessary to the Germans' right wing. Mackensen's army has been frustrated and repulsed southeast of Vladava. On the left bank of the western B.

three German regiments were destroyed here and the entire road retreat is covered with German bodies. It is expected that the result of this will be that all German formations will move northwards and new German arrivals expected there will probably barely cover the losses in July fighting. The Prussian Guard is said to have lost 14,191 men.

### RAIDERS IN SOUTH SEAS?

#### Japan's Navy Seeks Confirmation of Reports.

Tokio, Aug. 21.—Japan has received persistent reports that armed German merchantmen have been sighted in the South Seas, the Japanese navy has despatched several fast cruisers to search the waters of the Southern Pacific. Advice from Australia placed one of these German men in the Eastern Pacific in the neighborhood of the entrance to the Panama canal, where she was supposed to be waiting to prey upon merchantmen of the Allies.

Rear Admiral Suzuki, Vice-Minister of Marine, explains the despatch of warships as a measure of precaution. As a matter of fact, he said, the navy scarcely credited the reports, but wanted to make certain that shipping was safe in the Orient. About fifty German vessels were tied up in various neutral ports in the South Seas. If properly armed, at least thirty of them could do active service as volunteer warships. It was just possible that one or two had escaped.

### ELUDED THE PATROL

#### Warships Were in the Vicinity of the Arabic.

London, Aug. 21.—The submarine which sunk the Arabic is believed to be one of the big new U boats of the German navy. It had evidently been lying in wait alongside the steamer lane of Fastnet for some time. There is a strong patrol of British warships in that vicinity, but the submarine managed to elude their vigilance and escaped.

### HAVE ANILINE DYE SECRET

#### Mystery Surrounding Connecticut Factory Is Solved.

Hartford, Conn., Aug. 21.—With the announcement here that the Philadelphia hosiery manufacturers who had been blocked at all points in their attempts to get the precious aniline dyes necessary for their plants, and heretofore furnished by Germany, had formed the American Co-operative Dye and Chemical Works, came the solution of the secrecy pervading the mysterious, heavily-guarded "yellow works" at Gaister, Conn., wherein is the witchazel factory of Magnus, Maybee & Reynard, of New York City. The townspeople were sure poisonous gas bombs for war were being manufactured because of the yellow tinted and reticent foreign chemicals employed.

On account of the scarcity and consequent high price of phenol, the United States pharmacopoeia's name for carbolic acid, a special plant has just been finished where the first batch of carbolic acid crystals ever made in American was produced this week. According to original formulas solved by a Russian chemist, formerly employed in Germany, a black dye has been made that has withstood all the severest tests of 1,000 experts engaged by the manufacturers in the company, who say that black having been discovered the other colors are easy.

The factory, which is owned by a New York lawyer, John T. Heier, is being conducted by Dr. I. C. Stanislaus of South Bend, Indiana, and William Alms, a Philadelphia dye expert, Secretary C. B. Carter, of the Philadelphia Hosiery Manufacturers' Association, says the tests are beyond expectations and that the factory is sure to be added to and in time will supplant all need for imported German dyes, for the American dyes can now be produced quite as cheaply, notwithstanding the increased cost of labor in this country.

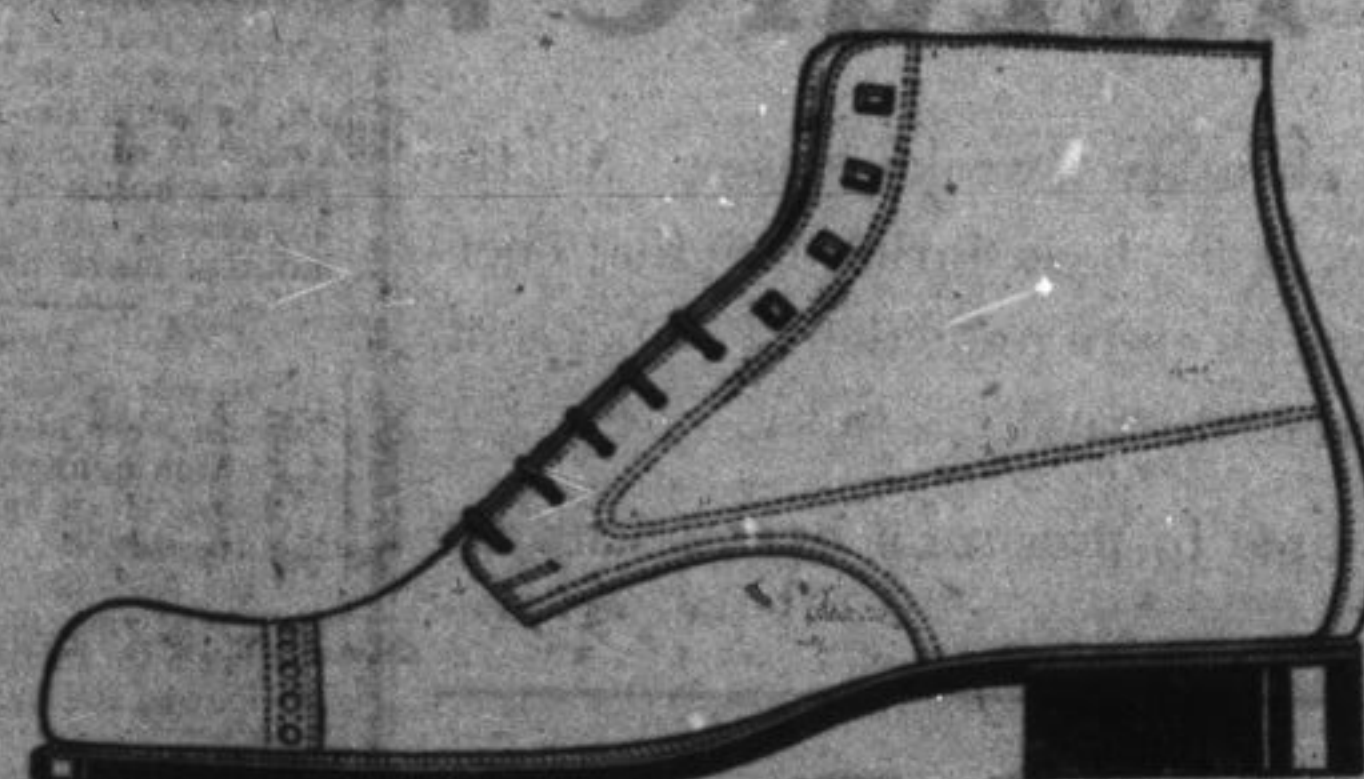
