In several others to the westward of Jesca the danger of the position is gradually increasing. Yet as long as the Russians continue to hold part of the angle formed by the Lower Niemen and Jesca, whose deep banks offer them a convenient position allowing them to conceal numerous obstacles such as barbed perts say. Until the enemy occuhold on the left bank is not secure. Therefore he is endeavoring to reach the right bank of the Jesca and is not attempting to cross the Niemen which are outside his range of fire, and all remains in the hands of Russians. The enemy gained his swift success at the cost of colossal losses.
