## SPORTING CIRCLES

### QUEEN'S ATHLETIC COMMITTEE WILL SOON DECIDE

Whether to Drop Out of Rugby This Autumn Or Not—Saturday's Baseball Game Was Cancelled.

John Dawson, secretary of Queen's athletic committee, when speaking to the Whig, stated that a meeting of the committee would be called about the second week in September for the purpose of deciding whether or not it was advisable to drop out of Rugby for the present season on account of the war.

There is a feeling on the part of some of the members of the committee that it would be advisable to run a senior team, but to discontinue the other teams. Although most of last year's senior players have gone to the front, it is thought that there will be many new men who will be able to fill the gaps.
