VISITING CLERICS IN COOKE'S AND CALVARY.

People Advised to Forget the Unpleasantnesses of Life and to Follow the Example of the Brook.
"Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me."
These were the words that Rev. K. W. Barton, M.A., Prescott, took as his text on Sunday morning, when he delivered a very appreciative sermon before a fairly good-sized congregation in Cooke's Church.

FINE FARM TRACTOR.

An Overland Car With Great Possibilities.

After driving a 1912 Overland touring car more than twenty thousand miles over the rough roads of Saskatchewan, A. W. Bell, a native of Saskatoon, conceived the idea of putting it to work on his farm. His theory was that if the car could stand three years of travelling over the so-called roads of that section of the country, it could go a step better and do the practical work.
The Overland was converted into a tractor by the simple arrangement of putting in an extra axle under the frame, two feet in front of the rear axle of the car, on which were placed two binder wheels. After removing the rear wheels of his car, Bell replaced them with small sprocket wheels, which were connected with large sprockets on the drive wheels by a chain. This reduced the speed of the car and gave it more power.
Practically all of Bell's neighbors, who were interested in his experiment, believed the scheme to be impractical. They tried to convince him that the engine would heat up too much, and declared the gears could not possibly stand the continuous strain. But, although the machine has been in almost constant use throughout the summer, no trouble has been developed. It has been run as many as fourteen hours a day, drawing a set of discs and a set of sixteen fast harrows, without even needing a fresh supply of water.
Bell states that he was able to seed thirty acres a day or harrow from sixty to seventy acres with his automobile. By drawing two twelve-inch bushers, he managed to break five acres of soil a day, or the equivalent to the work done by six or eight horses. The Overland consumed just seventy gallons of gasoline to put in the crop, while the cost of horse feed alone would have more than doubled the expenditure. The saving in time and labor was another important item. It took less than an hour to change the rigging of the car, so that at any time when its owner desired to make the trip to town, all that was necessary was to take of the farm equipment and transform the machine into a full-fledged touring car.

Kept It Quiet, Eight Months.

Brockville, Aug. 23.—After keeping secret eight months his marriage early last January, William G. Osmond, a well-known local athlete, announced the event to his patrons on Friday before leaving on a long-deferred honeymoon. Osmond and Miss Elizabeth B. Herron were married at Ogdensburg, N.Y., on January 5th.

A German Zeppelin that was approaching Vilna was brought down by the fire of Russian gunners.

Bulgaria has concentrated 150,000 troops on the Turkish frontier, according to a despatch from Saloniki received in Italy.

Little but arduous fighting is reported by the French along the entire front. Two weak attacks by the Germans in Lorraine were repulsed. Paris declared.

The Russian newspaper Ruskoye stands against the Germans north-west of the fortress of Brest-Litovsk.

Russian military men see in the determination of the German efforts to push across the railway north of Brest-Litovsk, a plan to cut off the Russian armies based on that fortress from those operating at Osowetz and thus enable the Germans to approach Osowetz from the south.

The Russian newspaper Ruskoye invalid states that the chief units of the Russian Baltic fleet are not in the Gulf of Riga, which a German fleet has entered and engaged the Russian naval defenders. The Gulf of Riga, the newspaper declares, is defended by mines and small warships.

Italian aeroplanes defeated an Austrian air squadron off the Adriatic coast. Three of the Austrian machines were brought down and their crews were either killed or made prisoners.

No fortress ever demanded such stupendous losses as Kovno. Entire German units were destroyed one after another when, with hands playing, Von Eichorn's army marched in dense columns as to a review, to storm the fort.

Three Russian warships and one German warship, and two German torpedo boats, all small vessels, have been sunk in the battle in the Gulf of Riga.

A British submarine torpedoed a German cruiser in the Baltic Sea. Cotton has been declared contraband by Great Britain and French the Government has issued a similar notice.

German losses in the Gulf of Riga naval battle were not less than two torpedo boats.

The Germans fired about forty shells into Rheims. Only one person was wounded.

Particularly fierce attacks in the region of Bielsk cost the Germans many men. In the region of Brest-Litovsk there is no change.

German attacks upon the Crest of Soudernach and to the north of Souchez were completely repulsed.

It is believed that Roumania will begin a general mobilization on August 23th. Relations between Bulgaria, Roumania and Serbia are excellent.

Thirty-nine lives were lost in sinking of the Arabic, including twelve cabin, six steering passengers and 21 members.

Berlin reports that the Germans have made further progress east and south of Kovno, penetrated further south of Narew, and crossed the Bialystok-Brest-Litovsk railway.

Referring to the evacuation of Kovno, it is said that almost the entire garrison gave up their lives before surrendering the position.

An Athens despatch to the Evening News says that neutrality negotiations between Turkey and Bulgaria have been broken off.

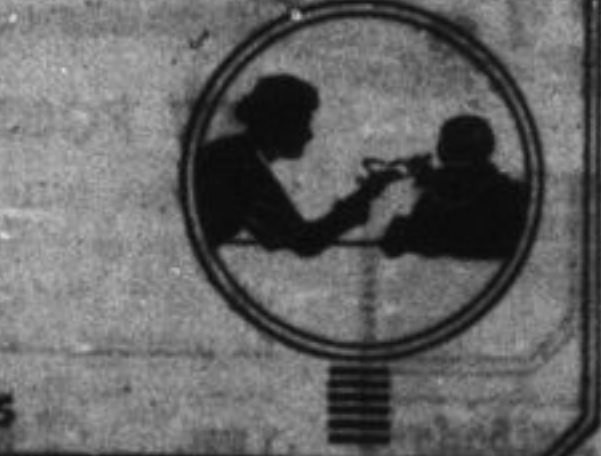
