One of the saddest parts of the war is the plight of the little children who are robbed of their fathers. Some are too young to understand the circumstances surrounding their father's absence, but all the same they miss him, and all the mother's kind talk will not soothe them. Children who are old enough to understand, long for the time when the war will be over.

"If I was just big enough I would get over there and take a shot at those Germans," was the remark of another boy, whose father is at the front. The youngster was clad in a suit of khaki, and carried his "swagger stick." He is sure to make a good soldier some day.

Every day one hears sad stories concerning the little children who seem to suffer on account of the war.
