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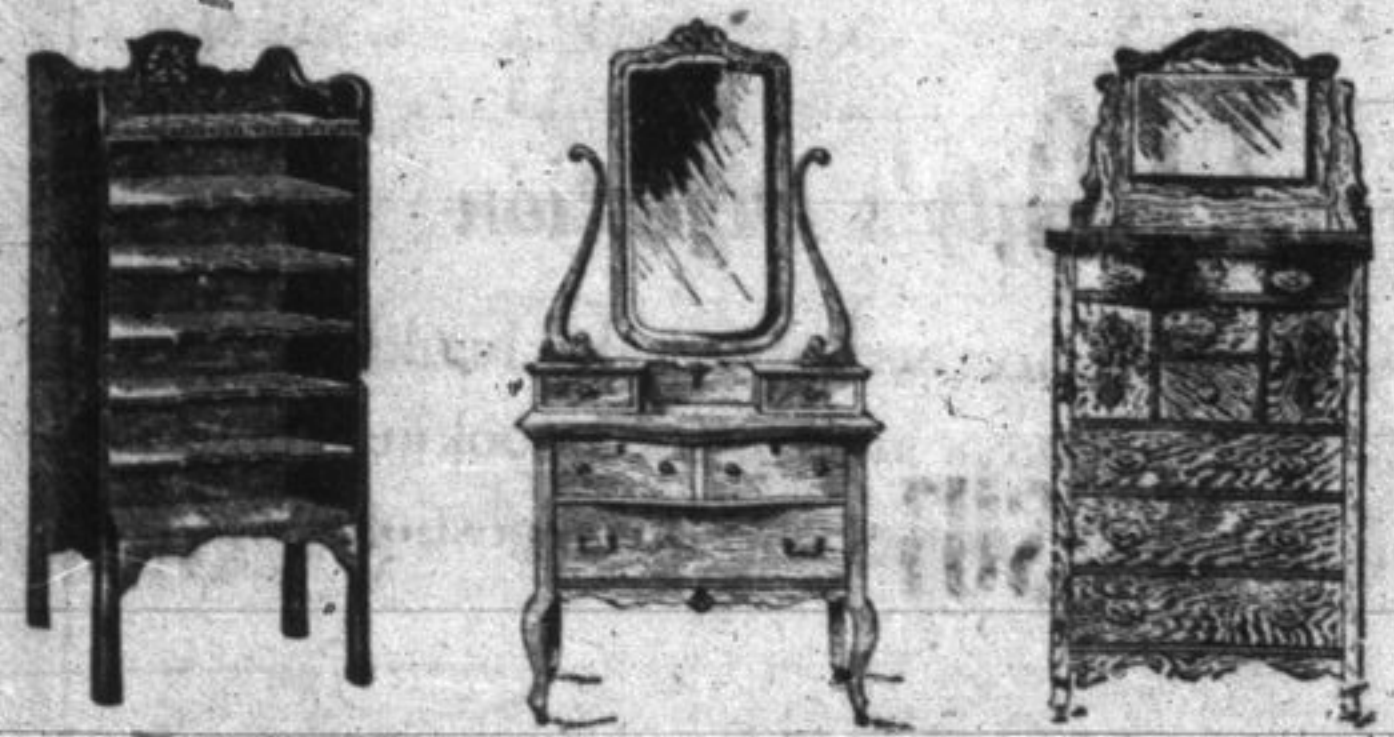

**SOLDIERS IN THE CAMP ARE DEEPLY RELIGIOUS**

They Attend Divine Services on Sunday Well.

**AN ARTILLERY RECRUIT**

WAS DISMISSED IN DISGRACE BY MAJOR MCKENZIE

Lieut.-Col. Ketcheson May Command the New 80th Battalion.—The 59th Battalion To Take a Route March To Napanee.

From Saturday noon until Monday morning, the soldiers in Barrieffield camp had an easy time, there being no drill. A short time on Sunday morning is devoted to divine service. The camp chaplains are "in command" at this parade, all of them being present. These were Major Starr, Capt. Milton, Campbell, Fitz-Gerald and Compton. The service is very impressive as are all drum-head services, and a large number of civilians attend. There was also communion on Sunday morning, there being over 150 soldier-communions.

Beside the regular church service there are always other services held by the chaplains and other religious workers at the camp. Capt. Milto holds a service in his marquee at the end of the 59th Battalion lines and the two "Plymouth Brethren," Messrs. Wallace and Sykes, also have service in their tent near the artillery lines. A unique idea is being worked out in the 34th Battery lines. A committee of the soldiers arrange for a service on Sunday in their writing tent. The scheme is working out splendidly and the battery turns out almost to a man. This is also a proof of the high type class of the men in the artillery batteries.

The artillery officers are determined that no man of an immoral nature will be a member of their battery and for this reason are taking a determined stand on the question and intend to carry it through to the end. On Saturday, information was reached Major McKenzie that a man in his battery was not of the material he wanted to train. The major, while the battery was on parade, explained the matter in a short address, and then ordered the undesirable to fall out, and take all of his belongings to a woods in the rear of the camp and remain there until he could be disposed of. He was discharged in disgrace within half an hour afterwards. Although other commanding officers have tried to get rid of evil men, it remained for an old soldier like Major McKenzie who was one of the best that Canada sent to South Africa, to carry out the only correct policy.

Lieut. Graham, 59th Battalion, and Sergt. W. H. Lloyd, M.C., spent the week-end in Belleville.

The 8th C.M.R. is getting ready for its 100-mile trek which starts on Wednesday. Lieut. Clapp, veterinary officer, states that the horses are in splendid condition and several of them have told the Whig that they are counting the days until they leave.

Pte. Nobis, 59th Battalion, was admitted to the Field Hospital on Saturday morning.

G. Butler, W. J. Simmons, William Chilcott, Joseph Whitford and Peter Paquette enlisted on Saturday at Barrieffield with the 59th Battalion.

It is announced that the 80th Battalion to be formed here will be situated in the lines used by the 38th Battalion, and this will greatly brighten up the only quiet spot in camp.

There is a rumor in circulation, though it cannot be verified, that Lieut.-Col. W. G. Ketcheson, 49th Battalion, is to be the officer commanding the 80th Battalion. Col. Ketcheson is from Belleville, and is well-known here as an experienced and efficient soldier.

Provost Sergt. Thomas Moore, 59th Battalion, has transferred from the 59th Battalion to the 14th Regiment.

Lieut. R. D. Bradshaw, has reported for duty with the 8th Regiment C.M.R., and is attached for duty and instruction.

The strength of the 59th Battalion on Saturday morning was 1,233 men.

The road into Barrieffield camp received its first coat of oil on Saturday morning.

The 59th Battalion will take a route march to Napanee this week. Lieut.-Col. H. J. Dawson is following the plan adopted by Lieut.-Col. J. R. Munro in taking his regiment through the country as much as possible to show the farmers what kind of men Canada is sending to the front, and impress on them the extreme necessity of every available man taking up arms and going overseas.

Col. T. D. R. Hemming, O.C. 3rd Division, and Major J. Hamilton, A.D.C. of S. and T., expect to be in Ottawa on Wednesday and it is understood that the question of winter troops here will be taken up.

Major. McLoughlin, acting officer commanding the 8th Regiment, C.M.R., in the absence of Lieut.-Col. J. R.

Munro, in Toronto, made a most thorough inspection of the regiment Saturday morning.

Lieut.-Col. J. R. Munro, and Major Rother, quartermaster of the 8th C.M.R., returned on Sunday from Toronto where they purchased an additional field kitchen for the regiment. The field kitchens have proved to great value on treks, and the new one will be delivered, it is hoped, in time for the Brockville trip.

Herbert Swetman, of the Y.M.C.A. staff left on Saturday night to take over new duties with the 77th Battalion at Ottawa. Mr. Swetman has been a most valuable man to Mr. Little here and has done some remarkably good work. He is very anxious to go overseas however, and hopes for an opportunity at Ottawa.

J. Carnegie, of the Ottawa Citizen staff who has been visiting his father Capt. Carnegie, of the steamer Missisquoi, was a visitor at the camp on Saturday afternoon.

The artillery guns have not yet been completely overhauled by the armourer sergeants, but they are expected to be turned over to the batteries in the next few days.

Pte. Copeland, 59th Battalion, is in hospital with measles.

Evangelist Watt, a graduate of the Moody Bible Institute, Chicago, conducted the services in the Y. M. C. A. tent on Sunday evening.

Rev. R. S. Banks-Nelson, Hamilton, will conduct a series of addresses in the Y.M.C.A. tent commencing this evening.

The soccer league schedule at Barrieffield camp under the auspices of the Y.M.C.A. is now nearly finished. A fast game was played on Saturday afternoon between "C" squadron, 8th C.M.R. and "B" company, 59th Battalion. Corp. Beadle has picked a fine team which is yet undefeated. On account of the drafting of "B" company for overseas service, Sergt.-Major Blake has had considerable trouble organizing the 59th Battalion team, but the team on Saturday was very fast one. Sergt. Harris "B" squadron, 8th C.M.R. refereed.

This evening "B" squadron, 8th C.M.R. plays "A" company, 59th Battalion. "B" squadron team is as yet undefeated.

In the soft ball league this evening "C" squadron, 8th C.M.R. will clash with "A" company, 59th Battalion, and "B" company, 59th Battalion, will play the Machine Gun Section, 8th C.M.R.

On Thursday evening the 32nd Battery baseball team will play against the team from "B" squadron, 8th C.M.R.

At Tete de Pont Barracks There is a movement on foot to have "C" Battery, R.C.H.A., changed from a permanent battery to one of the Canadian Expeditionary force. At present, men accepted as members of "C" Battery take out attestation papers for three years, as has always been the case, with the R.C.H.A. Some of the authorities are anxious to have the battery changed to the C.E.F. so that recruits could be accepted for the duration of the war or six months afterwards as the overseas attestation papers read.

The change would mean an entirely different scheme of pay for the men. At present the pay is based on rank, and allowance is made for clothing. For overseas volunteers with the rank of private or gunner the pay is the standard \$1.10 a day and clothing is issued as needed. It is possible to save some of the clothing allowance with the R.C.H.A., but on the whole the difference in the system of paying would effect only the clerks in charge of the pay office. Each man would get practically the same as he is getting now.

The Royal Canadian Dragoons at Toronto are now on the C.E.F. footing for accepting recruits and yet the benefits are to be derived from the change. "C" Battery should be as well, as it certainly has been doing splendid work since the war broke out. Over 150 men and a number of officers have been sent across and this has been done at the same time as the officers and N.C.O.'s of the R.S.A. have been so large that even Capt. W. F. Steacy, officer commanding the battery, has had to continue his work as instructor and yet the battery is sending over fifty men and two lieutenants every month and the recruiting and training of these men is being done and not interfering with the R.S.A. work.
