Two hundred of the fastest trotters and pacers in the country have arrived at the Empire City Park at Yonkers, N.Y., for the Grand Circuit meeting, which opens on Tuesday. It is estimated that horses worth close to \$1,000,000 are now on the grounds.

Father Stanton, the noted coach, has refused to reconsider his resignation from the Ottawa University staff, and leaves this week for Buffalo, where he will become connected with one of the Oblate mission bands of the United States. Coaches in Ottawa keenly regret his leaving.

The Ontario Jockey Club autumn meeting at Toronto which brings the Canadian racing season to a close on the track, promises to be exceptionally good, judging by the big list of entries. The Canadian-bred races have filled particularly well, and some New York horses are coming up for the rich open events.

"Dink" Campbell, the well-known Hamilton coach, has answered his country's call when he cast in his lot with the sportsmen's battery. "Dink" is well known in Hamilton, and during the past five or six years has coached many winning teams. Some four years ago he was with the Queen's football team at Kingston, and remained there for the winter to coach the hockey team. Last year he handled the Hamilton Rowing Club juniors.

Waite Hoyt, a 15-year-old high school boy, of Brooklyn, who has just been signed by John McGraw, manager of the New York Club of the National League, is said to be the youngest ball player ever placed under any form of contract by a big league club. Hoyt, who was pitcher of the Erasmus High School team last year weighs 165 pounds. After seeing him pitch in a high school game McGraw drew up an agreement with Hoyt's father whereby the boy when he is old enough to play with them. It may be two or three years before he takes part in a league game.

There will be no more Sunday baseball games in Winnipeg, for a time at any rate. The St. Boniface Association was fined \$100 and costs, and nine players of the team a dollar and costs each, for a game they played gaily of having played since they were last fined for a similar offence. While Manager Charles McGill gave the magistrate a pledge that there would be no more Sabbath day exhibitions until the appeal he intends taking to the Supreme Court is heard. NEW YORK SEAT \$59,000

Million-Share Days Give Increased Value To Membership.

New York, Aug. 30.—A succession of million share days has increased the value of stock-exchange memberships. Announcement was made of the sale of a seat belonging to the late George L. London to Walter Dreyfus for \$59,000, an advance of \$1,000 over the previous sale. This establishes a record-high price for several years. Three other seats have been sold for \$58,000 each.

Ask For Triple Holiday

New York, Aug. 30.—A resolution requesting the governors of the New York Stock Exchange to close the exchange Saturday, September 4th, thereby giving a triple labor holiday, was adopted to-day by members. The request will be acted on by the governors at a special meeting next week.

C.P.R. Shareholders Meet

Montreal, Aug. 30.—The annual meeting of C. P. R. shareholders will be held in Montreal on October 6th this being the 24th annual meeting of the company. The vacancy caused by the death of Sir Sanford Fleming will then be filled.

Steel Booked For 1900

New York, Aug. 30.—The Wall Street Journal says: The pool in U. S. Steel is a powerful one, and it is said to entertain expectation that the price will cross par within the next few months.

Starts Dividends

Toronto, Aug. 30.—It is announced that the first dividend on the preferred stock of the Dominion Steel Foundry Co. is being paid. The stock is seven per cent cumulative and dividends have piled up since June, 1913.

The company, which has a capital of \$3,000,000, half common and half preferred, was a merger of the Dominion Steel Casting Co. and the Hamilton Malleable Iron Co. In 1914 the company reported a loss on operations of about \$25,000, but this year they have been very busy on war and other orders.

Commercial Notes

Thomas A. Edison predicts seven years of prosperity for the United States and twelve months' more of war.

National Steel Car received \$125,000 order from Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway.

Out of nine new bank branches opened in Canada in July, seven were in the Province of Quebec.

Three paper machines at the new plant of the Abitibi Power and Paper Company, located at Ironquois Falls, Ontario, are now turning out 120 tons of newspaper daily.

The net earnings of the Winnipeg Electric for the month of June this year totalled \$84,645, which is the lowest in years. The decline from last year is \$62,797 or 41.9 per cent.

The announcement is made that the Dome Mines Company will increase its milling capacity to 45,000 tons per month, the order for the machinery having already been placed.

The total railway capitalization of the world is \$56,350,804,230, of which the United States has \$15,330,131,446. Of the total mileage of the world, over thirty-seven per cent, is in the United States.

Profits of Lipton's Ltd., for the year ended March 31st, were only half those of the previous year. No dividend will be disbursed on the ordinary shares, which heretofore paid 6 per cent.
