HOW TO SEND PARCELS

TO CANADIAN PRISONERS-OF-WAR IN GERMANY.

And Also to Canadians Fighting at the Front—Parcels May Be Sent By Mail Or Parcel Post.

In view of the fact that the Whig received from time to time enquiries as to the proper way of addressing prisoners of war and also Canadians fighting at the front, we publish the following instructions for the guidance of friends and relatives of soldiers. If this information is closely followed, there will be little chance of parcels going astray. de- volve.

If a man is a prisoner of war in Germany his parcels may be sent care of the War Office at London, or care of the American Consulate here.

Parcels may be sent by parcel post or mail to the men at the front, and are delivered on the field.

In sending parcels write the address, number (every man at the front has a number), initials and name, company or battery, battalion or brigade, Canadian Expeditionary Force, Care of the War Office, London.

KIOTA III IS ENTERED

IN THE MOTOR BOAT RACES AT TORONTO EXHIBITION

Kingston's Speedy Craft Will Go Up Against Some Of the Fastest Boats in America.

The fastest motor boat races in the world are entered for the Toronto Exhibition motor boat races which commenced to-day and will continue until Wednesday next. R. S. Waidron has entered his displacement boat Kiota III, which is considered the fastest displacement boat in the world. If there is any sea during the race he is expected to be able to defeat any of the boats entered on the hydroplanes. Among the boats entered against the Kiota are:

Peter Pan VII, a 53-mile an hour flyer owned by J. P. Black of Toronto.

Baby Speed Demon of New York, a 50-mile an hour boat owned by Stuart Blackton.

Buffalo Enquirer, a 50-mile an hour boat owned by the famous "Fingy" Connor of Buffalo.

Heldena, the speedy Toronto boat owned by Roger Miller. She goes 38 miles an hour.

Pupuka of Penang, a 35-mile an hour boat owned by Gilday.

Two boats from Henry Jeffreys of Lachine which are reported to go 40 miles an hour.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Movements of Vessels Reported Along Kingston Harbor Front.

The schooner Oliver Mowat is at Davis Dry dock undergoing repairs. Schooner Ford River arrived from Erie with 400 tons of Tobacco. At M. T. Co's wharf steamer India arrived with the barge Selkirk loaded with grain, and cleared for Montreal; tug Emerson cleared for Montreal with two grain barges. Schooner Katie Eccles arrived at Booth's wharf from Charlotte to discharge coal. Sloop Waffle arrived at Booth's wharf to unload wood from Rideau Canal points. Steamer St. Lawrence arrived in port on Wednesday evening and in a day or so will be put in water quarters. For the past couple of months this steamer has plied between summer resorts on the St. Lawrence River between Clayton, Alexandria Bay and others. Steamer Caspian will make her last trip on Sunday. As soon as the navigation season is concluded on the great lakes, several more of the large Canadian steamship line freighters will go into the coast trade. There will be few large freighters laid up this winter that can at all be equipped for the salt water. The wheelhouse of the steamer Kenora is to be placed amidships.
