

AUSTRIA IS ASKED TO RECALL ENVOY

United States Charges Flagrant Violation of Diplomatic Propriety--Austrian Ambassador Attempted to Cripple Industries of States.

Washington, Sept. 10.—Ambassador Penfield at Vienna has been instructed to inform the Austro-Hungarian Government that Dr. Constantin Dumba no longer is acceptable as an envoy to the United States, and to ask for his recall.

Secretary Lansing formally announced the action. It was the answer of the American Government to Dr. Dumba's explanation of his intercepted letters to Vienna outlining plans for handicapping plants in this country making war supplies for the Allies.

RELATIONS ARE STRAINED BETWEEN U.S. AND AUSTRIA

Washington, D.C., Sept. 10.—Relations between the United States and Austria-Hungary were strained to the breaking point today. A breach between the two countries, which may sever all diplomatic relations, but not necessarily result in war, was reached.

WHEN GAS WAS SWEEPED AWAY FRENCH REGAINED TRENCHES

Paris, Sept. 10.—The mountain slopes west of Colmar were the scene of furious fighting throughout last night. At Lingekopf, Barrenkopf and Scratzmaenele the Teutons launched heavy attacks in an effort to dislodge the French from their positions.

Allies Should Bombard Some German Cities

London, Sept. 10.—Thirty-seven persons were killed in Zeppelin raids on London Tuesday and Wednesday nights, it was officially announced this afternoon.

GERMANY HAS THE GALL

To Say That Dumba Merely Did His Duty. London, Sept. 10.—An Amsterdam despatch to Reuter's Telegram Company says the Wolf Bureau of Berlin has issued a semi-official note stating that if Ambassador Dumba only warned his countrymen against committing acts which the Austrian military penal code threatens to punish severely, "then this was not only his right, but also his duty."

TWO AVIATORS KILLED

When Their Aeroplane Collided With Barbed Wire Fence. Paris, Sept. 10.—Two French aviators, bent on a raid on a German position in Alsace, met death when they collided with a barbed wire fence as they were landing, causing their bomb cargoes to explode, according to Geneva despatches today.

DARDANELLES DRIVE SOON

The Allies Are Concentrating Large Forces.

THE SULTAN DEMANDS REINFORCEMENTS FROM THE GERMAN EMPEROR

DARDANELLES SOON OPEN

Paris, Sept. 10.—The Dardanelles cannot hold out much longer, according to the Athens correspondent of the Petit Parisien, who telegraphed his paper that he learns from a high authoritative source that the Sultan has sent an urgent demand to the Kaiser for reinforcements.

UNREST IN TURKEY

Paris, Sept. 10.—The Temps says that Said Pashe, Military Governor of Adrianople, has been summoned to Constantinople to be court-martialed for refusing to execute orders relative to the cession of territory to Bulgaria along the railroad line to Dedegatch, as provided in the recent agreement between Bulgaria and Turkey.

ENGLAND'S CUNNING GAME

Chicago, Sept. 10.—John J. Arnold, vice-president and head of the foreign exchange department of the First National Bank, addressing the Association of Commerce yesterday, said that England's cunning game is growing steadily, while she keeps many American factories busy making war supplies.

A DEARTH OF DOCTORS AT THE BRITISH FRONT

London, Sept. 10.—The response which has been made by overseas medical men to the call for service in the field has given great satisfaction in official quarters. The formal announcement of Ontario's reciprocity has removed the last obstacle. There is still a dearth of doctors, however, and the younger Territorial medical officers are being urged to go to the front and leave their duties at home to older men.

THE WAR HAS NOW DEVELOPED INTO CONFLICT BETWEEN MECHANICS

Bristol, Eng., Sept. 10.—Amid uproarious applause and some confusion caused by the British Minister of Munitions, addressed a packed hall of trade unionists here yesterday afternoon, striking the keynote of his speech with the declaration that the war had resolved itself into a conflict between the mechanics in the contending nations.

TEN SHIPS LOST IN A WEEK

London, Sept. 10.—A British official statement says: "The ships lost for the week ending September 8th number ten, of a gross tonnage of 37,836; fishing vessels four, tonnage 134."

FRENCH AVIATORS EXCEL

The Germans, the latter admitting the superiority. Paris, Sept. 10.—A letter found on a German flying officer says: "French aviators are now showing themselves only in large groups. The enemy evidently has a great many more machines than we have. It is thus almost impossible for us to evade his vigilance."

AIR SERVICE ADMIRAL

Flag Officer to Command Expanding Branch. London, Sept. 10.—Owing to the rapid expansion of the Royal Naval Air Service, both with respect to personnel and material, the Admiralty has decided to place it under the direction of a flag officer with the title of Director of the Air Service.

SERIOUS OUTBREAKS FEARED IN LONDON

Over the Zeppelin Raids--Anti-German Feeling Reaches Fever Heat--Horror And Resentment Over Killing of Women and Children By German Dirigibles.

London, Sept. 10.—Serious outbreaks by maddened mobs were feared here today as the result of the Zeppelins' latest bombardment. Special constables were sent to guard German shops boarded up since the internment of the enemy aliens.

About 7,000 Interned In Prison Camps

Ottawa, Sept. 10.—Over two hundred interned aliens have been released by General Sir William Otter, but there is still a gradual increase in the total number in the internment camps, now about 7,000, due chiefly to the gathering in of men who broke their parole.

SOMETHING IS COMING

Paris, Sept. 10.—The Allies are now abundantly supplied with war munitions, not to mention the stream of shells pouring to the front each day.

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
