8TH C.M.R. RETURNS

TO BARRIEFIELD AFTER ITS TREK TO BROCKVILLE

The Regiment is in Good Shape — Lansdowne Had 300 Pies for the Men—Well Treated Everywhere.

The 8th C. M. R. has returned from Brockville after covering a distance of 120 miles. The unit arrived at Barriefield camp grounds shortly after eight o'clock on Thursday evening. The mounted men left Brockville on Wednesday morning at about eight o'clock which means that the regiment covered sixty miles in thirty-six hours which is exceptionally good time. Although the horses were a little stiff they appear to be none the worse of the long trip.

Some of the officers and men speaking to the Whig stated that hospitality extended to them from the time they left Barriefield camp grounds until they arrived back would never be forgotten.

Leaving Brockville on Wednesday morning, the mounted corps proceeded to Lyn where the villagers were out to meet them. The church bells rung in honor of Lieut.-Col. Munro's unit. Each officer and man was presented with flowers, candy, chewing gum, apples and all kinds of soft drinks. The village band furnished music. The troopers were urged to stay for a meal, but the officers had arranged matters so that the meal would be served at another point. All along the route the farmers came out and treated the men to butter milk and apples.

Lansdowne was made by five o'clock on Wednesday afternoon where the unit remained for the night. The troopers were taken to the fair grounds where a big meal was awaiting them. The men state that they never saw so many pies in their lives. When they entered the building where the meals were served, they beheld about three hundred pies.

On Thursday morning the mounted corps started for Gananoque, arriving there about noon. They were met by mayor and school children, who escorted them to the armoueries. At Grassy Creek the evening meal was served. A part of the corps moved on to Barriefield. A few men were laid up with a touch of indigestion brought on from over-eating. It is thought that this trip will be the means of bringing a large number of men to the recruiting stations.

BARRIEFIELD SCHOOL HOUSE

Has Been Remodelled—The Re-Opening On Monday.

The Barriefield school house, which has just been remodelled, and is now looked upon as being the second best school house in the County of Frontenac, will be officially opened on Monday, September 13th. S. A. Truscott, inspector for the public for the county, was at Barriefield on Friday morning and made an inspection of the school house. When speaking to the Whig he stated that the school house at Sydenham was the only one under his care which was any better equipped.

The old Barriefield building which stood for over sixty years at the top of the hill, has been completely overhauled. People can't believe that it is the same old building.

When school was dismissed last June, the members of the board engaged carpenters to pull the place to pieces. The partitions between the two rooms were taken down and the building divided into three rooms. The room which was formerly used for class purposes was enlarged and the other two rooms will be used as cloak rooms. The ceiling was made higher and a hot-air furnace replaces the old stoves.

Miss Harold, who was in charge of the school last year, has been re-engaged.

The residents of Barriefield village and the surrounding district, who are supporters of the public school in that locality, are called upon to put up a very heavy tax on account of so much land being held by the Dominion Government.

WHO WILL GIVE \$500

TO PAY OFF DEBTS OF THE MOWAT HOSPITAL?

The Governing Board Wants to End Year Free of Debt—Convalescing Soldiers Will be Accommodated. The board of directors of the Mowat Memorial Hospital met on Thursday afternoon. The reports for the month were quite satisfactory. Twenty-one patients are under treatment. The receipts for the month from patients were \$235; from donations, \$640. The expenses for the month were \$410.

The financial year terminates the end of September, and before that date it will be necessary to secure about \$500 from friends. "No doubt some of the supporters of the institution, who have been waiting, will now send in their subscriptions. The October meeting is the annual, and a number of important matters will be discussed and settled as to ways and means of going on with next year's work. It was reported that the Hospital Commission for Convalescent Soldiers desire to use the institution for the care of men with tuberculosis invalided home from the front. As many will be taken as it is possible to accommodate.
