FINANCIAL MATTERS

DIVIDENDS IN SIGHT FOR DISTILLERS CORPORATION.

The Fiscal Year Ended June 30th Best in History — Earnings Increasing — Physical Value of Plants.

New York, Sept. 10.—The 1915 fiscal year, ended June 30th was an eventful period for the Distillers Securities Corporation, witnessing the emergence of the corporation from debt for the first time in its history and the entrance into a period of exceptional earnings from the manufacture of alcohol.

The past year has been a poor whiskey season, on account of the industrial depression, especially in the earlier months, and it was the demand by powder manufacturers induced by the war that made possible the good showing. The wiping out of the remainder of the debt was accomplished principally by proceeds of the sale of the major part of the 63,000 shares of United States Industrial Alcohol Co. common stock which were in the treasury.

The close of the fiscal period saw an appreciation in the market price of the corporation stock from \$5 to over \$30 a share and in the price of the 5 per cent. bonds from under 48 to over 67. It is practically assured that at the end of September the stock will be placed on a dividend basis.

At the close of business June 30th, 1915, the profit and loss credit balance of the corporation amounted at \$5,648,293, which is equivalent to 40 per cent. on the \$1,419,326.50 per cent. bond of the \$30,843,480 stock. Disregarding the plants of the company entirely, as of that date, there was a balance of net quick assets available for the bonds of 73 per cent. and this was after allowing for the payment in full of the \$1,472,000 American Spirits Manufacturing Company 6 per cent. bonds at par, and for the cancellation at part of the \$93,000,000 real estate mortgages of subsidiary companies.

In addition to this quick asset value of \$730 per \$1,000 bond, there is the value of the physical plants of the company. These are carried on the books of the company at a figure of \$43,628,511.

A Close Corporation.

Toronto, Sept. 10.—The Canadian Cannery Company, the new holding company that has been formed to handle the output of the various Canadian canning concerns, is a close corporation and none of its stock has or will be offered to the public. It is understood that the capital is a million dollars. The canning companies represented in the consolidation control about 98 per cent. of the total production of the Dominion, and it is considered that the other 2 per cent. will be included later on.

Britain's Food Supplies

Toronto, Sept. 10.—Britain is getting her food supplies in abundance, but she has to pay dearly for them. Figuring the flour trade between Toronto and Britain on the car basis extra costs amount to \$380, including the following items: War risk, per car, \$25; loss in exchange per car, \$75; difference in freight per car, \$250; difference in lute sacks per car, \$30; total \$380. Flour sold by a dealer here at \$4.70 per barrel, or \$1,504 per car would cost the British buyer \$5.90 per barrel, or \$1,880 per car, laid down in England, in lute sacks. The increase works out at \$1.19 per barrel, compared with 77 cents some three months ago, and about 30 cents in normal times.

To Manufacture Shrapnel.

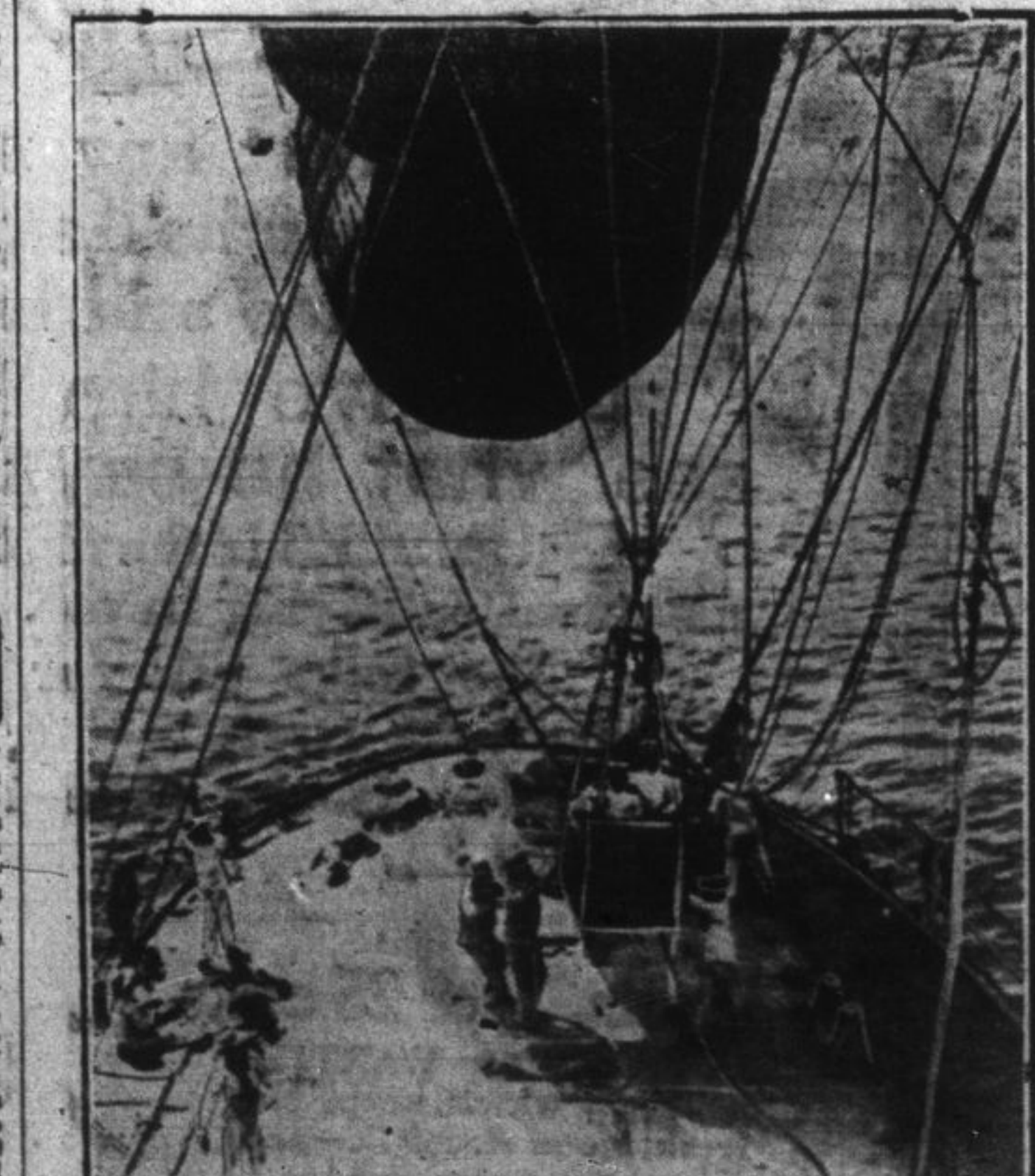
