WRITES FROM FRANCE UNDER DATE OF AUG. 26TH.

He Says That We May Get a Startler Some of These Days—The Cold Weather Is At Hand.

Corpl. "Jud" Gimblett, serving in France with the First Canadian Contingent, writing to a friend in the city under the date of August, 26th, says:

"I saw by the paper that 'Bill' my brother, was taking the R. S. A. course. I hope he pulls out all right. "So they have closed the bars in Kingston at seven o'clock. I consider that nothing more than an insult to the men in uniform. "Things continue to be very quiet here. I dare say that you will get a startler some of these days. We have been blessed with very fine weather all summer. It has been the coolest one that I have ever seen. We had about a week of dull, stormy weather not long ago, and that is about all the rain we have had, barring a few thunderstorms. "It is beginning to get rather cool at night, and it won't be long before we have the cold weather upon us. I imagine that it will be fierce, and for mud I guess it will give Salisbury Plains a close run. Of course, we have not had much mud as yet, but the ground seems to be the right sort for a pig wallow. "We have had considerable sport lately. Our teams manage to break about even on all the games. It certainly helps to pass the time away. "Every Sunday we have a church service in a nice shady field nearby. Our officers have a piano, which they bring out, and as the captain is a fine player, we get along very well for music. Then we have a choir, and they sure warble some. The chaplain gives us some very interesting addresses, so you see that we are well looked after in that respect. "There is a brass band belonging to one of the infantry battalions (the 10th, I think), not far from our billet, and they have had some real fine concerts lately. We can hear them quite plainly. Most of the time you can hear the bagpipes."

Osler & Hammond, Mr. Hammond, who was well known in Toronto, Kingston and Montreal, was drowned in the Lusitania disaster on May 7th, last, and although every possible effort has been made, his body has never been recovered. He was a member of the Toronto Hunt Club and a well-known polo player, and at the time of his death was on his way to take up a commission in an English Regiment. Mrs. Hammond, who was also a passenger on the Lusitania, was among the survivors.
