

THE SIXTEENTH DAY OF ARTILLERY DUEL

French Gunners Wrecked German Batteries And French Salients in Argonne--Aero-planes Raid the German Front And Bombard Junctions.

(Special to the Whig.) Paris, Sept. 14.—Flotillas of French aeroplanes raided the German front early to-day, bombarding railway junctions, while the incessant cannonade on the entire battle line continued for the sixteenth day.

Paris, Sept. 14.—In addition to keeping up a general cannonade at many points on the long battle front, French artillery yesterday succeeded in damaging the organizations of the Germans on the front north of the Oise and their works at Beauvoisines.

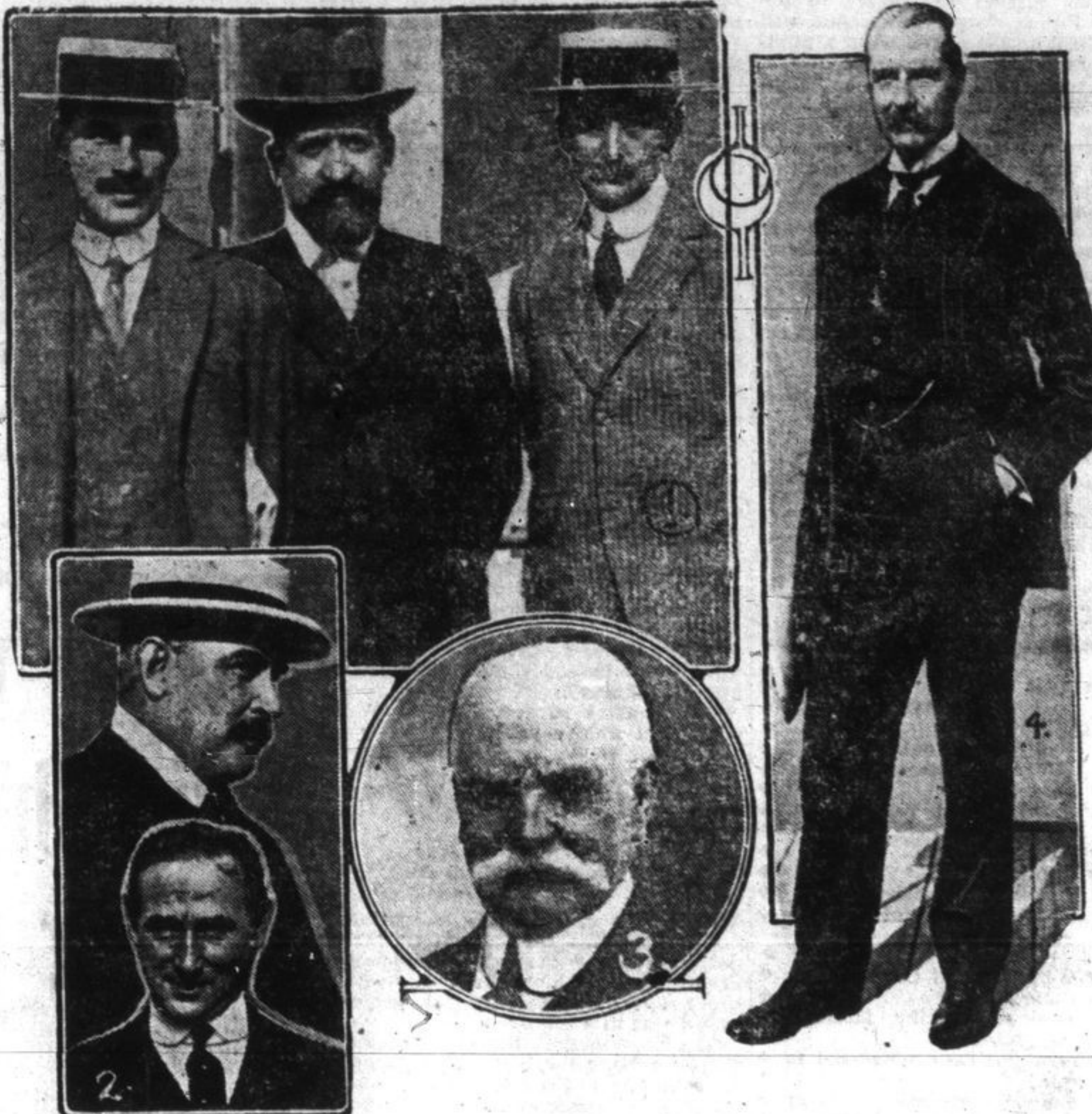
Turkish Army Cannot Hold Much Longer

Athens, Sept. 14.—It is learned from a quite reliable Turkish source that the German staff in Constantinople have informed the imperial military authorities in Berlin that it is impossible for the Turkish army, unless it receives effective help, to hold out longer than September 25th.

MONEY IN WAR RISKS.

U. S. Federal Bureau Receives \$2,004,696 and Pays \$720,653. Washington, Sept. 14.—In the first year of its operations, completed September 2nd, the Federal War Risk Insurance Bureau wrote 1,245 policies on American ships and cargoes, with a risk aggregating \$52,799,585, according to a report made by Director W. C. Delaney.

Kitchener Not Committed to Conscription

London, Sept. 14.—The parliamentary correspondent of the Daily News says that the present views of the cabinet on the question of compulsory service, which is now the most discussed question in the secret councils of the Government, are as follows: Uncommitted—Kitchener. For compulsory service—Curzon, Lansdowne, Lloyd George, Chutehill, Bonar Law, Long, Chamberlain, Selbourne and Carson.

TO BUILD NEW LINE

Russian Limer Sails With a Large Cargo. New York, Sept. 14.—The Russian-American liner Dvinsk sailed Sunday evening for Archangel with 408 passengers and 8,000 tons of cargo.

Arrest Dentist in Hamilton Bank Case

Hamilton, Sept. 14.—A sensation was sprung here yesterday in connection with the Union Bank theft case for which John McKinnon, former manager of the Barton street branch of that institution, was convicted and sentenced to three years in Portsmouth penitentiary.

50,000 Enlist in One Day in Britain

London, Sept. 14.—Increased recruiting due to the recent Zeppelin raids on England has added more than 50,000 soldiers to the British army. It is probable that within a week as many more will be enrolled, because of reports that Count Zeppelin had in person directed the raid on Saturday night on the east coast.

PITH OF NEWS.

Despatches From Near And Distant Places. The attendance at the Canadian National Exhibition totalled \$64,000. It is estimated \$15,000,000 has been spent by German secret service for press work outside of Germany.

DRIVE ZEPPELINS BACK.

(Special to the Whig.) London, Sept. 13.—British aeroplanes met and drove back Zeppelins which were attacking the east coast counties on Sunday night for the fifth time in one week. Three British aviators were killed or injured.

BIG INCREASE IN DUTIES.

In the Coming Budget of British Parliament. London, Sept. 14.—The Government has prohibited the withdrawal from bond of wine, spirits, tea, sugar, and some other dutiable goods, except at a rate corresponding to the daily average of the past three months.

Sollicitor Gets Long Jail Term.

London, Sept. 14.—Ernest Casson, solicitor, was to-day sentenced to four years for appropriation of clients' money. He went to Canada, obtained a good position, and returned under a warrant.

TO DEFEND LONDON FROM AIR ATTACKS

Admiral Sir Percy Scott is Appointed--German Submarine Sunk At Dardanelles--Turks Burn Seaport Town, Convinced Straits Must Fall.

(Special to the Whig.) London, Sept. 14.—London will be ready when the Zeppelins come again. Full details have not been made public, but it was learned to-day that the entire system of defending the Capital from sky attacks will be radically changed as the result of an important conference held last night.

"It will be a lucky Zeppelin that succeeds in passing the city outskirts," was the significant statement made by one aeronautical expert after the conference adjourned.

The appointment of Admiral Sir Percy Scott, England's greatest authority on naval gunnery, to take charge of the defences of London against Zeppelin raids, is only one of the features of the new "anti-Zeppelin programme."

Other measures will be kept secret for the same reason the Admiralty withholds information of its methods of meeting the German submarine campaign.

Turks Likely Retreating Into Interior.

(Special to the Whig.) London, Sept. 14.—News Agency despatches from Athens to-day reported that the Asia Minor seaport town of Fecha is in flames. It is inferred from this, the Athens correspondent cabled, that the Turks are convinced the Dardanelles defences are about to fall, and are retreating into the interior, burning coast towns.

Are To Evacuate Vilna.

Petrograd, Sept. 14.—The evacuation of Vilna will follow the cutting of the Vilna-Petrograd Railway, it was semi-officially admitted to-day.

The Germans are renewing their attempt to cross the Dvina near Linden under the curtain of a terrific artillery fire. The assault upon Dvinsk from the west has been fruitless.

In the Tarnopol district the Car's troops continue to drive the Germans back, taking prisoners and machine guns.

Registry For Kowkash.

Toronto, Sept. 14.—Should investigation show that sufficient ore has been found at the Kowkash gold camp, near Cochrane, to warrant steps being taken, the Ontario Department of Mines will open a recording office in the district. T. A. McArthur, Inspector of Recording Offices, has been sent to look into conditions.
