**BOY FELL FROM TREE AND SUFFERED A BAD FRACTURE OF LEG.**

Rupert Compeau, Stanley Street Was Picking Hickory Nuts—Companions Could Not Carry Him Home. An unfortunate accident occurred on Concession street near Alfred street on Monday afternoon where Rupert Compeau, about thirteen years of age, fell from a tree into which he had climbed, and had his left leg badly fractured, near the thigh.

After school hours, young Compeau with other boys about his own age, went gathering hickory nuts near the property owned by Francis Theriault. Having reached a high point in the large tree and standing upon a dead branch that snapped off from the trunk, the lad was precipitated to the ground below, almost thirty feet. In falling the boy struck forcibly against a branch that caused the compound fracture.

The other children who witnessed the accident tried to carry their companion to his home at 58 Stanley street. They were not equal for the task which was made all the worse on account of the excruciating pain the little fellow was suffering.

No other help was available and after the boy's father, Felix Compeau, had returned home from his work at the Locomotive Works at 6.30 o'clock, he carried his son to the house.

James Reid's ambulance was called and took the boy to the Hotel Dieu.

The fracture received was a bad one and it is not known as yet whether the boy will have to lose the leg.

**Y. M. C. A. Board Meeting.**

**"MONTREAL NUMBER ONE."**

Canada, the Over-Seas Club and The War Office.

The Montreal corresponding secretary of the Over-Seas Club (G. R. Lighthall) has just received from the head office in London, a copy of a letter from the War Office, dated 23rd August, in which the Army Council request that their thanks be conveyed to the citizens of Montreal for their generous gift of \$11,768.74 to the Royal Flying Corps, which sum will be utilized in the provision of a light aeroplane of government design. The machine will be known as "Montreal Number One," and will leave for the front in the next week or so, if it has not already gone forward.

The particular amount in question was given by Robert Hampson. In addition, the British Empire Grain Company has given a like amount for a second machine. The Montreal Board of Trade has just about completed its subscription list for the third machine, and at the present rate at which money is being received the amount required for a fourth machine will soon have been contributed by the citizens of Montreal.

It is interesting to note that upwards of twenty fighting aeroplanes have now been contributed through the central committee of the Over-Seas Club, which is also rendering a great national and patriotic service by its Tobacco Fund, towards which Britons across the sea have now given upwards of \$250,000.00.
