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NEWS FROM OVERSEAS

CAPT. PENSE WRITES BEFORE LEAVING FOR FRONT.

Pte. Edward McDermott saw Queen's University Men With Princess Patricia's—Allies Can Break German Line Any Time.

From information contained in letters received from the members of the 21st Battalion it is evident that the battalion crossed to France about September 13th.

A member of the transport, writing to his wife, stated that the transport was to leave England on September 12th and the rest of the battalion would follow the next day.

Capt. H. E. Pense, writing to his mother, states that he had just returned from London where he had been on a business trip. While in London, he visited his uncle and aunt, Colonel and Mrs. W. D. Gordon. He was also speaking to Capt. George T. Richardson who was in England on leave of absence. He considered that Capt. Richardson looked very well when one took into consideration what he had gone through while in the trenches.

While going along one of the streets in London he met Clive Betts, who is connected with Lieut. Col. Ross' unit.

According to his letter, the battalion expected to leave shortly as all the rifles had been fixed in action and the bayonets had been sharpened.

Pte. E. McDermott writes. A letter received on Monday morning from Pte. Edward McDermott, attached to the Motor Transports Column of the First C.E.F. in France, states in part:

"Everything is looking rosy over here for a sure victory; in fact there is nothing else to it. Any time they take the notion I believe we can smash the German line.

I have been over a couple of times to where the Princess Pats are stationed and saw the bunch from Queen's University. They are all well and enjoying themselves. They have also been in the trenches for several weeks now. We are having a very easy time, although there have been heavy artillery duels along the line. Our infantry is standing fast."

A peculiar thing about this letter, which was received by James McDermott, Johnson street, was that it had two Canadian postage stamps attached to it.

LYING NEAR THE TRACKS.

The committee decided to advertise in the city newspapers Clause 5 of the Garbage Collection By-Law with reference to the nature of the receptacles to be purchased by every household. One receptacle is for garbage and combustible material, and the other for ashes and other non-combustibles.

ATTENDED QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY
Young Men Held In Ottawa Auto Accident Case.

Six men, all members of the 77th Overseas Battalion, lie in hospitals in Ottawa, as the results of a serious accident which happened at the entrance to the camp. One of these is dangerously injured with a fractured skull, while the remaining five are more or less seriously hurt about the legs, arms and bodies.

The men who are being detained by the police pending further inquiries are Joseph Gilhooly, son of Deputy Chief of Police Joseph Gilhooly, who was driving, and James Howard the owner of the car.

Both are students. Joseph Gilhooly only returned from Kingston about a month ago, where he had been studying medicine at Queen's University. They felt their position very keenly, as also did Deputy Chief Gilhooly, who is one of the best liked members and one of the oldest in the Ottawa police force. Col. Street expressed his regret at the unfortunate occurrence. His opinion, with others who were on the scene of the accident, is that it was the result of a miscalculation of the driver.
