WIN THE CHAMPIONSHIP

OF THE QUEEN'S BOWLING CLUB RINK SERIES.

W. M. Campbell's Rink Took the Honors, Winning Out by 16 to 11 in the Rain.

O. O. Boyd, F. Williamson, Dr. E. H. Young and W. M. Campbell (skip) are the men on the championship rink of Queen's Bowling Club. They showed their superiority on Thursday evening by defeating C. E. Taylor, Dr. A. E. Knapp, L. A. Zuleit and J. Leckie (skip) by 16 to 11. The green was fast and distance hard to judge but the playing was exciting and an extra large crowd of enthusiastic bowlers were present. During the game a light rain came down but the game did not have to be stopped.

In winning the championship of the club, Mr. Campbell's rink will receive the cup donated by W. R. C. Young and also the club prizes which will be presented sometime in October after the season closes. In the doubles on Thursday evening, J. W. Corbett and F. Kinnear defeated C. F. Smith and W. R. Ballie by the largest score yet recorded this season. At one time the score was 23 to 8 and the spectators then lost count.

A Montreal despatch says: According to Secretary Melville and other McGill football officials, they are ready to go right ahead, and while the red and white have lost heavily through the war, they will have a team, if the union decides to continue their schedule. Should the union decide to continue playing this fall as usual, it was announced that Frank Shaughnessy will again act as coach. Two McGill delegates will attend the meeting in Kingston and they will be held to have the schedule continued, even if only to a home-and-home series.

The 59th Battalion needs 300 men immediately and an attempt is being made to recruit part of that number in Kingston. The tent on the Market Square should, but is not at present attracting enough men. There are hundreds of fellows walking the streets of Kingston who are out of work and should enlist at this time. Only seven men have enlisted in the battalion in the last seven days.

George Webb Offord, who was born in England but who has been living in the city for a number of years has been accepted as a member of "C" Company, and is now on parade at the side of his son who enlisted a short while ago. The other six who have enlisted are: F. W. Thomas, England; John McKagan, Scotland; James Belboosoff, Russia; Arthur Aiken, England; Ernan Jordan, England; and Herbert Todd, Wolfe Island.

IN MARINE CIRCLES. Movements of Vessels Reported Along the Harbor. The steamship Robert McDonald arrived in port with a cargo of pressed hay, from Wolfe Island. M. T. Co's Bulletin: Steamer Windsor passed up Friday morning on the way to Oswego to load coal for Montreal; steamer Advance passed up light Friday morning on the way to Port Colborne, to load grain for Montreal; tug Emerson cleared light for Prescott and will return to Kingston with the barge Ungava; tug Emerson will clear tonight across with coal; steamer Rosemount arrived up light, and cleared for Port William.

STORY OF AN ENGLISHMAN

Who Enlisted And Went Overseas With R.C.H.A. Draft.

Lieut.-Col. G. Hunter, Immigration Agent, meets all kinds of people. He told the Whig a story of a man on Friday morning that sounded as if the hero had been recruited in a story. Some nine months ago, a well-dressed young man dropped into his office and asked for work. It did not matter what kind as long as it brought in money. He did not look to be anything ordinary, "foater," and the Colonel in conversation found out that he was the son of an English lady and a pensioned Spanish officer. The family had a large residence in the suburbs of London and set up a very high social position. Through bad investments in South American ventures, the father lost everything. The family was broken up and the son came to Canada and to Kingston. He was at work for two weeks on the farm of W. McLean, Pittsburg, but he was not strong enough for heavy work and had to leave. Col. Hunter secured a position for him at Rockwood Hospital and he did splendidly. He enlisted some months ago in the R. C. H. A., and left on the last draft from "C" Battery for the front. He has a sister a nurse in Egypt.

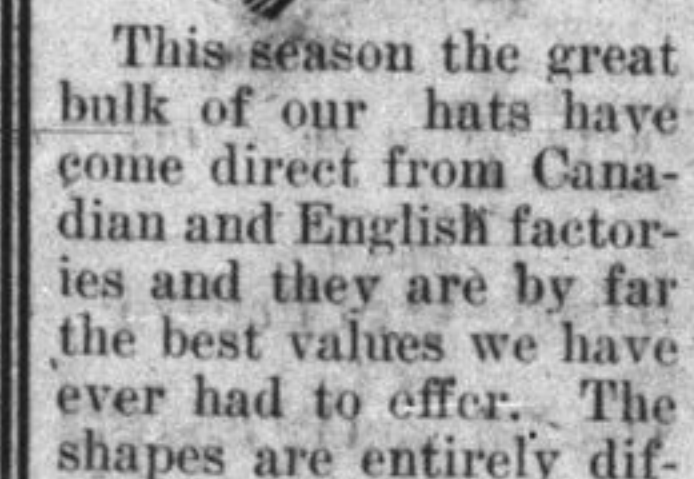
Returning To Front.
