WOMAN'S HEROIC ACT FOR SCIENCE SAKE

Inoculates Herself With Deadliest Strain of Gangrene Bacilli--To Test Cure's Efficacy--Her Faith in Injection Justified, And She Recovers.

Paris, Sept. 23.—Mary Davis, a young English woman who has been working in the pathological laboratories of the American ambulance since January, has just performed an act of heroism as great as any recorded upon the battlefield, an act for which few precedents exist. Her work has been the examination of bacteria from the wounded arriving at the ambulance, and assisting in the experiments which animals to determine their virulence, work for which her studies in the Pasteur Institute in Paris has fully qualified her.

Her duties in the last few months were chiefly directed towards the study of gaseous gangrene. She has seen many examples of the horrible results of this infection, and had observed the invariably fatal course of the disease in animals inoculated with the bacilli. She watched and assisted in the experiments in which guinea pigs were inoculated with gangrene bacilli. She had become convinced of the efficacy of injections with quinia hydrochloride, and had concluded that the experiments on small animals had given all the results of which they were capable, and that the time had come for an experiment on a normal human body, but not one from the battlefield, fatigued and wounded and possibly infected by other bacilli.

Well aware that her plan would be presented if it became known, she determined, without word to anyone, to risk her life in an attempt to demonstrate the efficacy of the treatment which she was convinced would cure the victims of this dread disease.

Deliberate Preparations
Her preparations deliberately and completely made, she waited until she was about to leave for a holiday, so that her absence would not disturb the work in the laboratory. She chose the deadliest strain of bacilli in the laboratory, obtained from the latest fatal case, of which two drops of culture suffices to kill a guinea pig. Then she inoculated herself in a manner most certain to produce the disease in animals, injecting 50 times the amount used to kill a guinea pig, making one injection deep into the muscles of her thigh, the other just beneath the skin.

Two hours later she quietly came to the laboratory and asked to be treated in the same manner as animals under experiment.

The consternation caused by her announcement among the medical staff may be easily realized. Gangrene is so rare in civil life that it is practically negligible, but since the war the dramatic rapidity and the horribleness of its effects make it more dreaded than any other form of disease, even tetanus, which war has produced.

Injections with a quinia solution were made at once at the points where she had inoculated the deadly bacilli. She was sent to the nearest hospital for observation and further treatment. Quinia injections were given a second time. Symptoms of a slight degree of infection developed within 24 hours, but they subsided without an operation becoming necessary. She is now completely recovered.

The young heroine, who is not yet thirty, will be the first to regret that the story of her act has become known. She is a hard and conscientious worker, absorbed by her duties and absolutely free from any impulsive tendencies or the wish for publicity, her sole interest in the dangerous experiment having been its scientific interest in her own treatment as if she were one of the laboratory guinea pigs.

Calmly Described Symptoms.
She calmly described the symptoms and pointed out how they compared with those observed in an animal.

A simple underbody will serve to wear under the quiant bodice, and the rules for making the simplest guimpe will serve in this instance. When it comes to the neck, finish, however, will have to be gathered between double "TT" perforations so that the standing collar may be attached with center-fronts and backs even.

To make the outer-front and back first gather under-arm edge of front between double "TT" perforations; stitch tape under left edge, drawing gathers to the required size. Sew front to right shoulder and under-arm edge and sew stay to left as notched. Arrange on underbody, center-fronts and center-backs even; bring large "O" perforations at shoulder in fronts together and tack.

Next, gather the sleeve between double "TT" perforations; close seam as notched. Close cuff seam as notched. Sew to sleeve, single large "O" perforations and seams even. Sew sleeve in underbody armhole as notched, easing in any fulness.

For the skirt close back seam from large "O" perforation to lower edge and finish edges above the opening. Turn hem at lower edge on double "O" perforations; gather upper edge between double "TT" perforations. If skirt is desired with panel front see cutting directions. Turn under-front edge on slot perforations in panel; stitch along line of single perforations in skirt section, leaving edges free above large "O" perforation in panel for opening. Sew to lower edge of underbody over belt, center-fronts and backs even, large "O" perforation at under-arm seam; if skirt is made, without panel stitch tape under gathers at upper edge from center-front to back edge.

If eyelets are found difficult to make tiny crochet rings may be seen to either side of the front of the waist and the satta cord laced through them.

It is possible to have an afternoon frock that is both quiant and fashionable, as is shown by the design illustrated here. Chiffon cloth in a pale shade of blue is the material used, and for the trimming there are bands of black panne velvet across the lower edge of the front panel and pipings of black about the neck and sleeves. Gauze or some sheer fabric may be used for the front panel if preferred. The materials required to make the dress in average size are 5 yards 28-inch chiffon cloth; 1 1/2 yards plain gauze for 2 1/2 yards if underbust is 15 cents.

AUSTRIA GERMANIZED
The Germans Are Working Out Their Programme.
Berne, Sept. 24.—The Germanization of Austria continues steadily. The latest development is a congress of municipal representatives of German-speaking Austrian towns, ostensibly for helping the municipalities to adapt themselves to war conditions, but really more for the consolidation of the German-speaking element in the Austrian Empire.

Next Sunday the foundation stone will be laid on the Austro-German frontier of the so-called Turm der Bundesgenossen, or "Tower, Sealing the Bonds of Fellowship between Germany and Austria-Hungary." Building operations will be begun, it is stated, immediately.

The lower part of the tower will consist of a memorial hall, the walls of which are to be covered with tablets commemorating the names of soldiers of neighboring towns who have fallen in the war; while the upper portion will take the form of a vast urn in which it is proposed to kindle fire on all German and Austro-Hungarian national festival days. The tower will be over four hundred feet high.

The Germans Are Exhausted Says Prince
Petrograd, Sept. 24.—Prince Eugene Troubetsky made an important speech at the Moscow Conference of Zemoznan and Municipal Councils. "At the present moment," he said, "this Zemoznan Conference is the most authoritative institution in Russia. If the Conference were to content itself with passing a resolution it would be merely striking a blow in the air."

"If we thus fulfil our duty as citizens, shall we have a right to say: 'Now is no time for strikes and a revolution?' The German army is exhausted. Its only hope is in a revolution here, but that is not and must not be."

"However audacious our proposals may be, they should be made with absolute loyalty. Discord does not and must not exist. The sending of a deputation of the highest authority in the course I recommend. Russia can still stand on her own feet."

DR. AUSTIN FLINT DEAD.
Altenet Who Took Prominent Part in Thaw Trial.
New York, Sept. 24.—Dr. Austin Flint, the distinguished physiologist, alienist and consulting physician died yesterday, at his home, just after he had put on his coat and was preparing to go out. Apoplexy was found to be the cause of his death.

Although Dr. Flint was in his 80th year, he had been comparatively active up to his death. He took a prominent part at the jury trial to determine Harry K. Thaw's sanity in July, and kept up the fight which he had waged for seven years to keep Thaw in Matteawan.

Bulgaria Invoiced Food.
Bucharest, Sept. 24.—News comes from the Bulgarian frontier that today, by direction of the Bulgarian authorities, merchants and shopkeepers in the frontier districts were summoned to town halls to make declarations as to the quantity of food-stuffs they had on hand. Requests by the State continue.

LAYING NEW MINE FIELD.
Germany's Action Between Baltic, Cattagel and North Sea.
Amsterdam, via London, Sept. 24.—A Berlin dispatch received here says the German Government has announced that a new mine-field will be laid south of the outlet to the Sound and that, beginning next Friday, a pilot service will be established to enable neutral shipping to traverse the dangerous zone.

The Sound is the channel between the Danish Island of Scotland and Sweden, which connects the Baltic with the Cattagel and the North Sea. The waterway formerly belonged to the Danish sovereigns, who for many years collected tolls from foreign vessels using it. In 1857, however, by a treaty with the commercial nations of Europe, the dues were abolished.

DOMINIONS AND THE WAR.
British Government Discussed Subject With Borden.
London, Sept. 24.—The Colonial Secretary, replying to Lord Lansdale in the House of Commons said he is in constant communication with the Governments of the self governing dominions in matters relating to the war.

The Government took advantage of Sir Robert Borden's presence in England lately to have a full and confidential discussion with him. The premiers of the other Dominions had been made aware that if circumstances make it possible for them to visit England the Government will warmly welcome similar discussions with them.

BULGARIA'S WAR STRENGTH
In Much Better Position Than in Balkan War.
London, Sept. 24.—A Bulgarian reserve officer, who is preparing to leave London to join the colors, said last night: "The general mobilization includes ten divisions of the Bulgarian army, one division having been added since the Balkan war. It now affects 250,000 rifles, as compared with 216,000, the previous numbers."

The strength of the artillery has been increased by approximately a third, and the stores have lately been replenished. The reservists now called to the colors will be better equipped than during the Balkan war.
