NO INTERCOLLEGIATE RUGBY GAMES THIS SEASON.

Some Exhibition Contests May Be Played In Aid Of Patriotic Funds—Meeting Of The N. H. A.

There will be no intercollegiate rugby games this fall. This was finally decided upon, at a meeting of the executive of the C.I.R.F.U., held Saturday afternoon in the Hotel Frontenac.

A resolution was passed as follows: "Owing to the existing circumstances, intercollegiate rugby football will be discontinued for the present season."

Although there was nothing given out officially, it is understood that there is a movement on foot to have Queen's, Varsity and McGill play exhibition games, the proceeds to be given to patriotic purposes.

Those present at the meeting were: President, J. C. McClelland, Toronto; Secretary, H. H. Hallett, Queen's; John Dawson, Queen's and C. J. Tidmarsh, McGill.
