REV. S. J. M. COMPTON CLOSING HIS PASTORATE.

"I Go Because I Cannot Be Content To Let Others Fight For You And Me," Says Pastor To His Congregation.

"I go because I cannot be content to let others fight for you and me. I go to do my part in preserving the Christian faith. It is three and a half years since I was called to this charge. I cannot stay here and see others go to do work I might do. I cannot see young men go forth in a careless way to meet what seems to be almost certain death. To them I must go, to minister unto their needs in the name of Jesus Christ."

These words, from John xv, 12th verse, formed the text of Rev. Mr. Compton's evening sermon, which was a most forceful one, pointing out Christ's wonderful love for His people.

"Love takes a man into the face of danger," said the speaker. "To love as Jesus loved is your duty and my duty. I believe that every Christian man and every Christian minister is called to do his duty to Christ in this hour. No man who knows the love of God can stand aside. It is impossible. I can excuse the man who does not know the Christ from standing by with his arms folded, but there is no excuse for the man who professes the love of Jesus to stand by unconcerned."

St. John's Church, Portsmouth. Canon Loucks conducted the services in St. John's Church, Portsmouth, on Sunday evening and spoke to a large congregation. He chose as his text, Psalms lvi, 11: "Thou crownest the year with thy goodness." The church was beautifully decorated with the fruits of the harvest. The choir gave special music.

The death of Joseph Matheson, C.M.P.P., is reported at L'Ardoise, C.B., in the eighty-third year of his age.

Letters patent have been granted to the Electro-Zinc Co., Ltd., with headquarters at Sherbrooke, Que., and a capitalization of \$24,000.

A new million-dollar navigation corporation, to be known as the France and Canada Steamship Company, Limited, has been incorporated.

Henry J. T. Wardlaw, Weston, will apply to Parliament for a divorce from his wife, Eda Luella. Resident Wardlaw, now in Detroit, on the usual grounds.

Bryce M. Stewart has been appointed statistician of the Department of Labor, in succession to Robert H. Coates, now Chief Census Commissioner.

Minister of Marine, Vialle on Saturday resigned from the Italian Cabinet. Premier Salandra assumed the duties of his office until a successor can be selected.

Allan Newman, a prominent and well-to-do farmer of Gosfield, North Essex, was killed on Saturday by the discharge of a shotgun while hunting an owl.

The Edmonton Bulletin understands, unofficially, that Dr. R. G. Brett Balfour has been appointed by the Dominion Government as the next Lieutenant-Governor of Alberta, and that he will assume office on October 7th.

The International, a monthly paper edited by George Sylvester Viereck of New York, is prohibited from circulation in Canada in any way. Any person in possession of this publication from now on is liable to a fine not exceeding \$5,000 and imprisonment.

A semi-official statement has been issued at Stockholm denying the report that Swedish ships are being sold abroad for the purpose of raising cash preparatory to Sweden's participation in the war. It is declared that no such sales are contemplated.
