ON BARRIEFIELD HEIGHTS WITH THE OVERSEAS TROOPS

All Sunday morning the wind and rain came to Barriefield camp and the result was a general disturbance that brought disaster to many of the canvas homes, particularly the large marquees. The marquees are used for dining tents, quartermasters stores, lectures, and orderly offices. The men were given their meals in other tents beside the regular dining tents, and no great inconvenience was felt. Few of the Bell tents blew down.

September 30th. The band of the 8th C.M.R. will also be present at the fair and if arrangements can be made a special train will run from the city.

The band of the 80th Battalion will certainly be a good one judging by present indications. Capt. Watson, adjutant, is taking a great interest in its organization and is choosing only highly qualified men.

F. W. Little, secretary of the Y.M.C.A. at Barriefield, is spending a week in Buffalo, N.Y.

The 80th Battalion has had a wonderful "crime" record since coming to Barriefield camp. A crime in military circles is an offense even as common as drunkardism. Capt. Watson, adjutant of the battalion was able to tell the Whig on Saturday that although the battalion has been mobilized almost three weeks and there are 700 men under canvas, only two men have been brought up before Lieut-Col. W. G. Ketchum. These cases happened a few days after the battalion was mobilized, and the colonel gave severe sentences. The effect is now being felt as the men realize that good conduct is necessary in the organizing of a battalion for overseas service.

Sergt. Thompson, 33rd Battery, who played on last year's Argonauts Rugby team was in Toronto last week, and brought back with him a foot-ball for the boys in the battery. He is organizing a foot-ball team among the men.
 Lieut. G. M. Huycke, 33rd Battery, was in Peterboro over the week-end.
