BUILDING IN KINGSTON.

Shows a Total Value of \$170,780 For Nine Months.

During the nine months of 1915, ending Sept. 30th, the City Engineer reports that the total amount of building permits taken out at his office amounted to \$170,780, as compared to \$264,626 for the same period of 1914. Last year there were military stables, Locomotive Works' building and part of the Reliance Moulding Company's structure included in the building operations. This year the building in Kingston has been confined to dwellings, a theaterium and general repairs.

The building permits taken out in September totalled \$15,076, as compared with \$13,412 for the same month last year.

SCATHING INDICTMENT A MEMORIAL SERVICE

OF GERMAN PHILOSOPHY BY PROF. JOHN WATSON

Who Gave a Splendid Address Before Knox College Alumni Conference in Toronto On Thursday.

The Toronto Star says that a valuable contribution to the archives of Knox College were made on Thursday in the papers read before the Alumni Conference by Prof. John Watson, D.D., LL.D., of Queen's University. Prof. Watson selected as his subject "German Philosophy and the War," and he traced the gradual development of Prussia's military force. Concluding he said: "On many at least derive from such expressions the hope that, in spite of the appalling ferocity and barbarity with which the present war has been conducted by Germany, notwithstanding the wild and whirling words of an Emperor devoid of self-knowledge; beneath all the vapouring of a press which reflects the inflated notions of a people giddy with unforseen success; one may hope that in the breasts of many sensible Germans, at present forced to be silent, there beats a more equitable pulse; and that, at the close of a war unexampled in ferocity and brutality there will emerge a chastened and subdued Germany, which has learned the 'open secret' that no nation can respect itself that does not respect others."

150 Enlisted in Kingston Last Month

Approximately 150 recruits have enlisted in Kingston in the last month and three-quarters of this number are Kingstonsians in every sense of the word. This number is made up of seventy men enlisted with Major E. C. Barrett for the 89th Battalion, thirty-nine men for the 59th Battalion, thirty with Major A. Stroud for the division squadron he is raising, and the remainder with the units at Barriedfield camp and at the 14th Regiment Orderly Room.

FRONTENAC TEACHERS

The Programme Carried Out at Friday Morning Session

The South Frontenac Teachers' Association met again on Friday morning with another large attendance. On Thursday afternoon, the programme was postponed and the members attended the industrial exhibition. The election of officers was postponed until Friday afternoon's session.

On Thursday evening Mr. Stapleton read the report of the Ontario Educational Association and S. A. T. Bennett, I.E.S., gave a splendid address on "Superannuated Teachers." A bill is being introduced into the Ontario Legislature to superannuate teachers and inspectors and the bill was thoroughly discussed.

On Friday morning Dr. H. G. Park, Toronto, gave an address on "The Place of Language in Education." F. Sine, M.A., Sydenham, lectured on "National Ideals on Education." The programme for the morning closed with an open discussion on the examinations in Part I, the discussion being opened by Mrs. Revell, Mrs. Gamsby and Miss Harold.

A collection was taken up for the Red Cross Society and the large sum of \$50 was raised.

LATE ARCHDEACON DAYKIN.

Service in St. George's—Remains Taken to Ottawa.

The funeral of the late Venerable Archdeacon Daykin took place from St. George's Cathedral on Friday morning. The Bishop of Kingston officiated, assisted by Dean Starr and Canon Forner.

The hymns sung were: "Now the Laborer's Task is O'er" and "The Saints of God Their Labors Past."

The pallbearers were Archdeacons Dobbs and Carey, Rev. J. O. Crisp, Rev. Mr. Chaffoy, Rev. Mr. Forrester and Rev. A. Cook.

After the service, the remains were taken to the G. T. R. station and transferred on the noon train to Ottawa, accompanied by the deceased's family and other relatives.
