Shows a Total Value of \$170,780

For Nine Months. During the nine months of 1915 ending Sept. 30th, the City Engineer reports that the total amount of building permits taken out at his office amounted to \$170,780, as compared to \$264,626 for the same period of 1914. Last year there were military stables, Locomotive Works' building and part of the Reliance Moulding Company's structure in-cluded in the building operations. This year the building in Kingston has been confined to dwellings, a theatorium and general repairs. The building permits taken out in September totalled \$15,076, as com-
