ON BARRIEFIELD HEIGHTS WITH THE OVERSEAS TROOPS

Thursday afternoon was a half-holiday an advantage of Col. Hemming's generosity. On the turn at Barriefield village—the passenger cars were running within forty feet of each other, one line up the hill and the other down to the city. 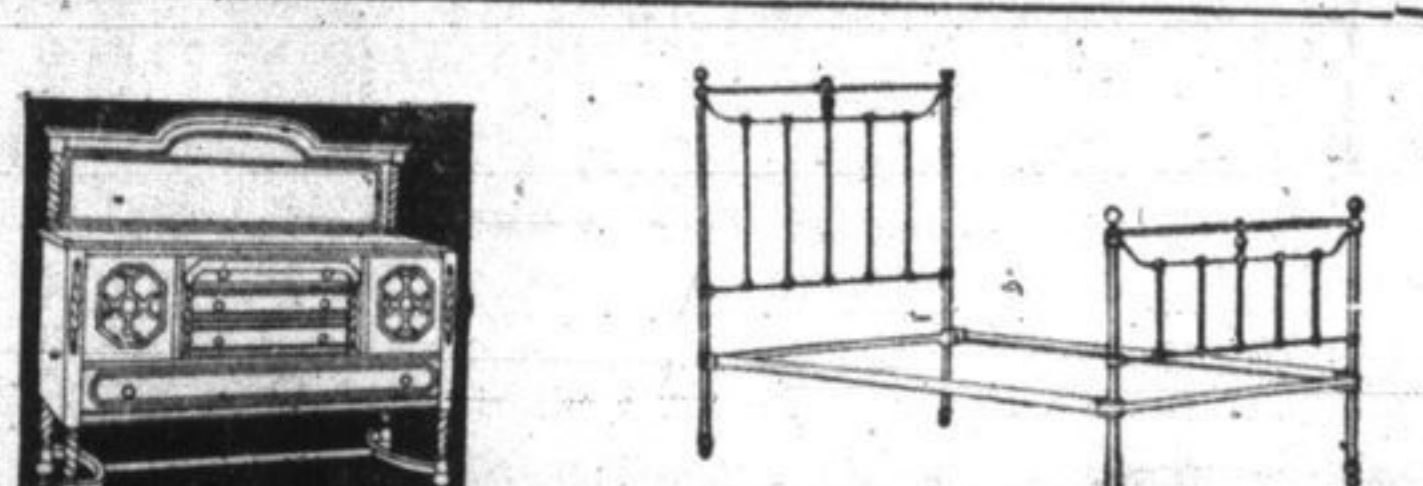
